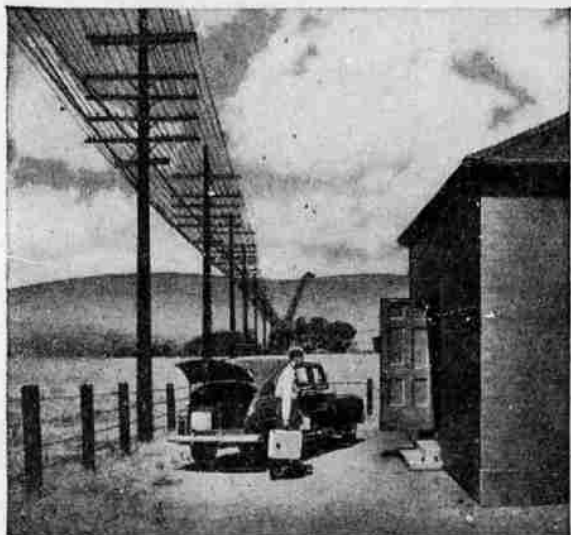

STILLWATER, Okla., Oct. 22
(AP)—Stopping the pressing is decreasing and creasing and Aggies are getting baggy here today.

It's all because the aggie-students at Oklahoma A&M College—claim they're being taken at the dry cleaners.

To make the cleaners pull down their pants (pants 50 cents, suits 90), the powerful campus-wide student association proclaimed an "aggie-baggy" season and launched a stillwater cleaning boycott.

The students demanded "fair" prices yesterday but didn't give the exact measurements.

There are about 11,000 aggies, and even if half of them wear skirts that's still a lot of pants about half the pants in Stillwater.

From now on bluejeans a native costume) are de rigueur at campus socials, says boycott chairman Gene Drake.

Any student who insists on a reet-pleat will have to get it in some other town than Stillwater. You can bet this has the cleaners all steamed up. They claim they'll be out of pocket if prices shrink.

"We can't," says cleaner spokesman Reuben Jay.

Chiang Kai-Shek
May be Forced to
Give up Manchuria

PEIPING, Oct. 23.—(AP)—President Chiang Kai-Shek is trying to head off disaster for his armies of North China and Manchuria—and this may call for the hard decision to abandon Manchuria.

Chiang time and time again has said Manchuria will be defended to the death.

If he changes his mind it will mean for him a heart-breaking but realistic approach to the problem with which the government armies have been unable to cope.

Here in brief is what events of the past week have brought him face to face with.

The Communists are top dog in Manchuria and very much so; inner Mongolia is threatened; Taiyuan, capital of the north province of Shansi is hard pressed, possibly doomed; in North China the danger increases.

Reports are current here that Chiang has decided to abandon Manchuria and bring all his troops there south of the Great Wall. These reports may or may not be well founded.

But the belief is strong in Peiping that the government's current fighting in the Manchurian corridor to North China is designed more to blast a way out than to blast a way in.

The abandonment of Manchuria would fit the strategic conception which Li Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, when commander of U. S. forces in China, is credited with having advocated.

That was to pull back the extended lines, which the government has been maintaining in Manchuria at prohibitive cost,

and consolidate for a solid defense zone in North China.

Those who argue for this view say it would be better to withdraw the armies than to have them bottled up in Manchuria, there to wither and eventually surrender to the Communists.

Fog Blamed For Traffic
Crash That Kills Woman

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 22.—(AP)—Dense fog on the Pacific Highway south of here was blamed for a collision in which Mrs. D. S. Heisinger, 30, lost her life last night.

Donald W. Diamond, Troutdale, driver of a truck and trailer that crashed into the rear of the woman's automobile, said he never did see her car, the fog was so thick.

The truck and trailer sprawled across the highway at the spot, 10 miles north of Albany. Traffic was rerouted on the old Pacific Highway through Jefferson until the main route was cleared.

Diamond, uninjured, was not held.

Little Hope Offered
For Wounded Negro Boy

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Oct. 22.—(AP)—Hospital attendants offered little hope today for the life of Willie Dee Curlin, 7, shot after a schoolboy quarrel here Tuesday. The Negro youth has been in the hospital three days with a critical body wound from a .22 caliber, hollow-nosed rifle bullet. Sheriff R. L. Gillmouthe said he was holding in custody David Munner, 13-year-old schoolmate of Curlin. Melvin Curlin, 9, brother of the wounded boy, also was held.

Clogged Arteries Freed
By New Operation

LOS ANGELES.—(AP)—A spectacular new operation which restores arteries that have been stopped up by injury, hardening or other disease was demonstrated for the first time to the American College of Surgeons here.

The arteries are all lengthwise for as much as two feet. Clotted blood, dead tissue, and fat-like substances clogging them are literally scooped out until the inside diameter of the blood vessel is large enough to do its work again.

Tavern Holdup Charge
Faces Former Pugilist

OREGON CITY, Ore., Oct. 22.—(AP)—Jimmy Garrison, 32, ex-main event fighter at Portland, was held in jail here today accused of taking part in the Lonnie Logsdon holdup last summer.

Logsdon, a night club operator, said he lost \$6,250 to four armed men at his Lake Oswego home. Garrison, who was indicted on a charge of assault and armed robbery, previously was accused at Seattle of taking part in the holdup of a night club there.

Actor, Lady Friend
In Hands of Law
After Wild Jaunt

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—(AP)—"Drunk, noisy, loud and boisterous," read the West Los Angeles Police blotter after screen star Robert Walker was arrested and booked yesterday.

"Why I've been drunk for 25 years," radio officer L. L. Brown quoted Walker, who at 29 has a \$100,000-a-year contract at M-G-M studio, "but this lady, Thelma Patricia Byrnes, 22, hooked on suspicion of drunk driving is certainly not drunk. Heck no; she could drink this whole jail full of liquor and never get drunk."

Brown said he and another officer chased Walker's 1949 Cadillac for three blocks before they forced Miss Byrnes, at the wheel, to stop. He said she had been driving on the wrong side of the street.

Brown said the actor related that he had met the young woman at a private party and that they later went to a bar and "had a few drinks."

"He also became belligerent and wanted to fight five officers at the station," said Brown. "He asked, too, that someone call his former wife, Jennifer Jones."

She is the mother of his two children.

Walker's second wife, Barbara Ford, daughter of screen director John Ford, sued him for a divorce a month after their marriage July 8.

Walker was ordered to appear next Monday to plead to the drunk charge.
