Russia Spends Millions To Aid Polish Industries

PARIS, Oct. 25.—(P)—Russia has poured the equivalent of about \$450,000,000 into postwar Poland to help develop new steel, chemical, cement and other industries, the United Nations was told today.

Tadenz Lychowski, Polish delegate to the Assembly's 58-nation Economic Committee, made the estimate.

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Berliners Defy Russian Threat Of Prosecution

BERLIN, Oct. 26.—(P)—Berlin's socialists gave a defiant answer yesterday to a Russian threat to prosecute six leaders of the anti-Communist City Government accused of "warmongering."

A statement published in the official Social Democratic newspaper charged that the Soviet action was intended to terrorize the people of Berlin.

The newspaper added that the people of Berlin, as well as their political leaders, desired peace but that "peace now is endangered by nothing so much as by the actions of the Soviet Military Administration."

The naming of the councilmen who spoke at an anti-Communist demonstration Sept. 9, which was followed by rioting, came as reports circulated in Berlin of enlarged Soviet police forces and tightening of restrictions.

The Soviet threat to councilmen was contained in a letter Col. Alex. J. Jellissarov, Soviet deputy commander, wrote to Walter Schreiber, a Christian Democrat, who is deputy chairman of the City Assembly.

Although Jellissarov called on the council to take action against the accused he added that the Soviet evidence against "the warmongers" had been "turned over to competent military authorities."

He said they made speeches at the Sept. 9 rally "of a Fascist and militarist nature which were violations of Allied Control Council laws for Germany."

Just how the Russians plan to punish the accused city officials is not clear.

All Governors Send Congratulations to Mack

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 26.—(P)—A book containing letters of congratulations from the governors of all 48 states was presented today to Connie Mack on the completion of 48 years as manager of the Philadelphia Athletics.

The book was presented by Mayor Bernard Samuel, who told the 85-year-old baseball veteran: "You have been a leading exponent of clean sports, and clean living, and the example you have set during your long and eventful career has been and ever will be an inspiration to the youth of America."

Among the messages was one from Governor Wallgren of Washington. It said: "Your name is a household word in every sports-loving family."

\$850,000 Distributed To Klamath Indians

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 26.—(P)—Distribution of \$850,000 to 1865 members of the Klamath Indian tribes has begun. Raymond H. Bitney, reservation superintendent, said each Indian is eligible to receive \$500 and that about 200 war veterans can draw an additional \$200.

The money has been held in a reserve fund under a 1937 grant from proceeds of lumber sales. Congress has required that each recipient of the \$500 confine use of the money to farm land or livestock improvement, education or medical and dental expenses. The veterans' payments are unrestricted.

The former vice-president of the B. C. district of the International Woodworkers of America (I.W.A.) was elected by acclamation at a constituent meeting Sunday.

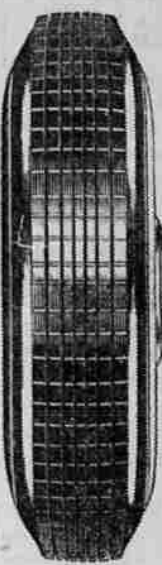
Ernie Dalskog, district president of the I.W.A. before the recent

It was understood the I.W.A. may make a bid for affiliation with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada (A.F.L.).

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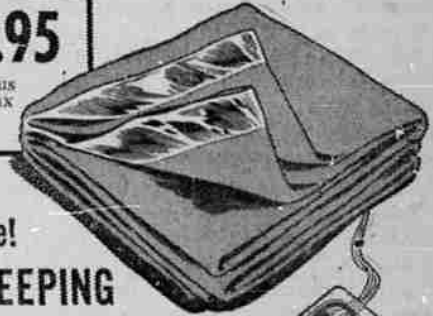
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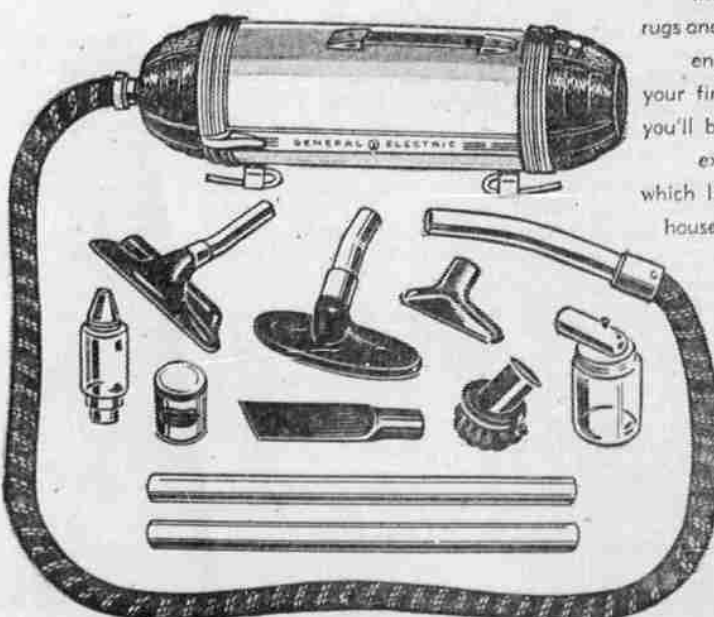
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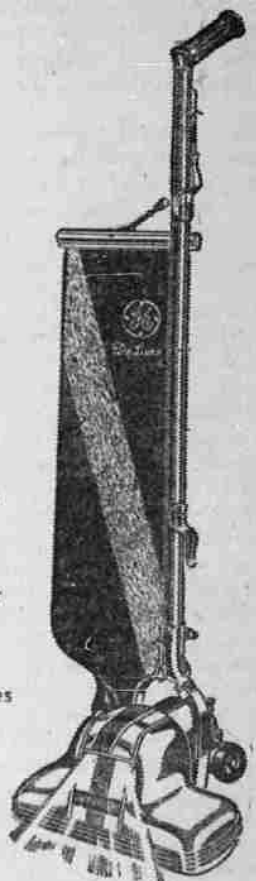
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
