

Father's Search For Soldier Son Has Happy Ending

CAMP BRECKENRIDGE, Ky., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Henry Edelson's two-and-a-half-year nation-wide search for his 18-year-old soldier son came to a happy ending in an army camp here yesterday.

The 40-year-old Seattle grocer and his missing son, Danny, embraced and the youth wept unashamedly upon his father's shoulder.

"My boy, my boy," Edelson greeted the young military policeman. "This is a dream come true. It was a long, long trail to find you."

The reunion between Edelson and his son, who had enlisted at Chicago when he was 16 after running away from home, was in the office of Chaplain Lyle Bartholomew. Young Edelson, who had taken the name of "Darrell Dane," had not been told his father was in the camp where he had been stationed for five months after serving 14 months in Korea.

Edelson, with the aid of the Chicago Tribune and the Fifth Army authorities, had traced his son to Camp Breckinridge. Since the youth had left home, Edelson had sought the aid of detective and other agencies to find his son but without success.

"I honestly can't say why I didn't write the family," young Edelson said. "I started dozens of letters, but never got one finished."

I'll read it back to you if you insist... but you won't recognize it.

I didn't know anything about the search. I'm awfully glad my dad found me. It would be wonderful to see the rest of the family again."

His father said "the only thing I'd like to do is take him home to his mother for a turlough." His wish probably will be granted, said Capt. Frank Lillyman, Edelson's company commander. He is eligible for 34 days of leave, Lillyman said.

The youth left home in 1946, the senior Edelson said, with \$3.50 in his pockets following a series of "misfortunes." He fell behind in his studies, smashed the family automobile and broke up with his girl friend.

TELEVISION SPREADING

LONDON.—(AP)—The British television audience is growing steadily. The General Post Office reports 3,450 persons took out television receiving licenses in August to run the total up to 61,700 in Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Radio receiving license including television numbered 11,324,400. There were 509 prosecutions during August for listening in without them.

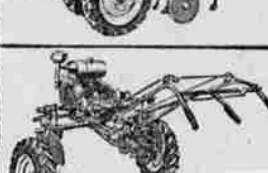
Broadcasting is a government monopoly in the United Kingdom. Ordinary radio licenses cost a pound (\$4) a year. Television is a pound extra.

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Contempt Order Stay in ITU Case Assailed by Govt.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The government yesterday asked the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Chicago to cancel its stay of the contempt of court order against the AFL International Typographical Union.

National Labor Relations Board attorneys also asked the Circuit Court to dismiss the ITU's appeal from the contempt conviction.

They said the appeal from a federal district court was "frivolous" and the contempt order should be made effective immediately in the "public interest." Copies of their petition to the Appeals Court were made public here.

On Oct. 18, Federal District Judge Luther M. Swygert in Indiana held the printers' Union guilty of contempt for alleged Taft-Hartley Law violations in contract negotiations with newspaper publishers.

Swygert ruled the ITU had evaded an injunction he issued in March barring the union from seeking closed shop conditions for printers.

He gave the Union until Monday to revise its bargaining procedures to comply with the Taft-Hartley Law but the Circuit Court's stay temporarily suspended this order.

U. S. Economy at Issue

In opposing the Union's appeal, NLRB attorneys said that without Swygert's order being in effect the Union could continue seeking illegal contract terms from publishers and:

"A serious failure will result in the enforcement of the provisions of the Act in a large and important segment of the nation's economy."

"Employers will be either (1) compelled by economic necessity and the economic pressure exerted by appellants (the ITU) to acquiesce in appellants' unlawful demands... or (2) compelled to suffer the consequences of strikes, slow-downs, and other disruptions to their business operations because of their refusal to enter into discriminatory contracts."

"Either alternative will be to the nation's irreparable injury."

The NLRB attorneys argued further that the district court contempt order is not appealable.

Expenditures Of Top Parties Shown

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—A week before election, the Democratic National Committee Monday reported expenditures of \$1,503,709. The Republican National Committee said its were \$1,706,370.

The Republican report covered Jan. 1 to Oct. 18; the Democrats' from Jan. 1 to Oct. 22.

Democratic Committee contributions since Jan. 1 were listed at \$1,196,827; the Republicans, at \$1,464,753.

The Democratic committee said it had had \$315,367 on Jan. 1, making \$1,512,194 available for spending up to Oct. 22. On Oct. 22, it had a balance of \$8,485.67.

The Republican report did not list money on hand Jan. 1 or the present balance.

Meanwhile, the Labor Committee for Truman and Barkley reported receipts of \$32,535 and expenditures of \$22,653.

The 1948 campaign committee of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union reported \$115,226 received and \$63,834 spent.

Reports were handed Congress under a law requiring listings of political contributions and expenditures.

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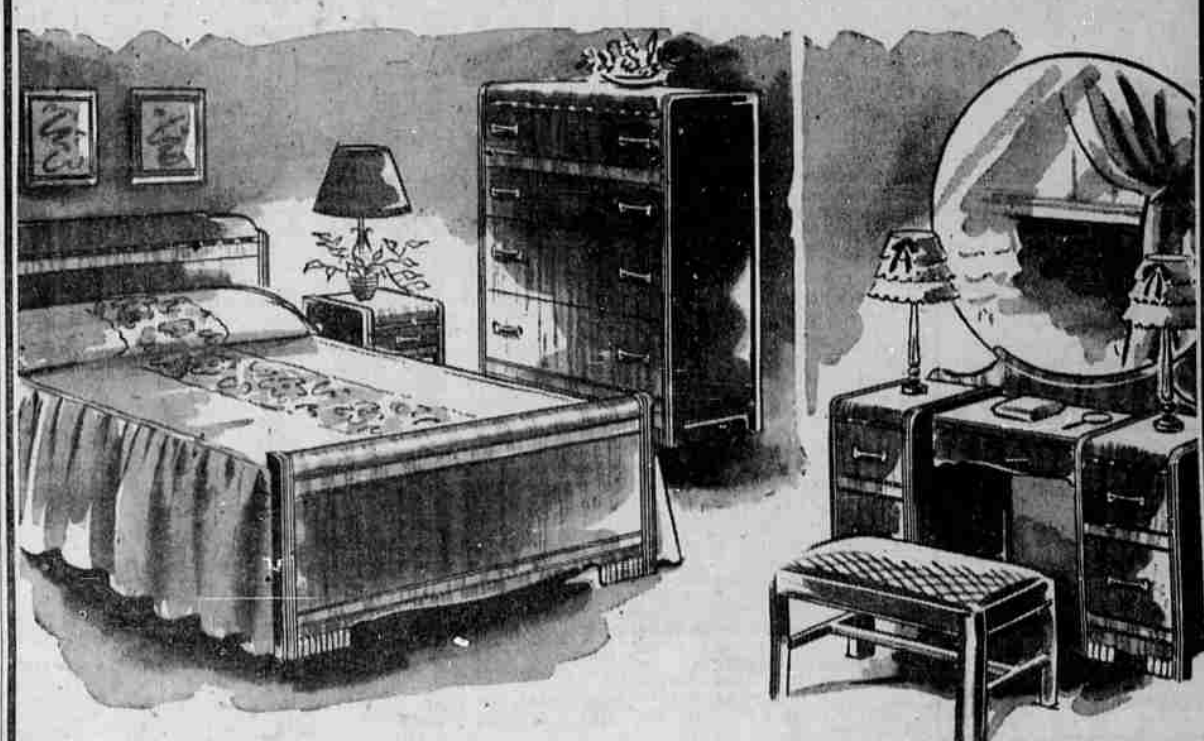
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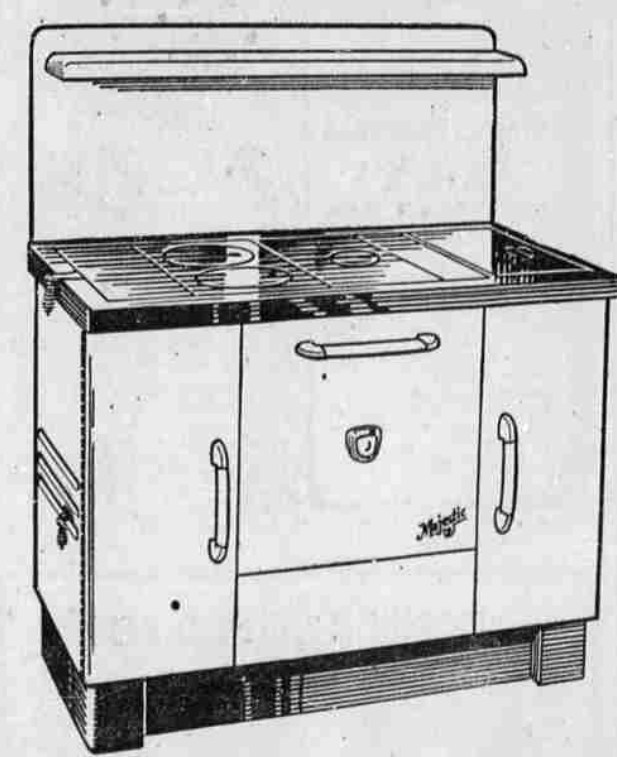
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
