

LET'S GET IN THE SCRAP

Farmers Asked For Scrap Iron

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18. (AP) — Secretary Charles Brannan said Sunday field officers of the agriculture department have been asked to aid in a scrap drive sponsored by the commerce department.

The object is to get farmers to comb their places for scrap and sell it to dealers. Brannan and Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer said farm scrap is "particularly desirable as much of it is of heavy cast iron, which is scarcer than steel scrap."

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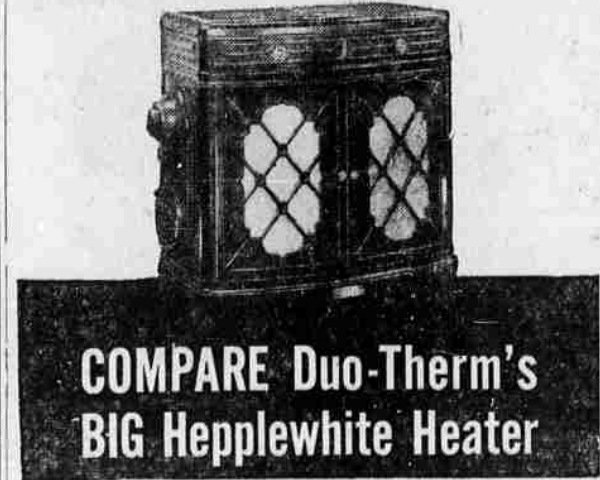
