Alleged Turkey Raid Leads to Vagrancy Fines

Floyd Hessner, Henry Metzger, Floyd Scott, Shirley Scott and Bob Hink, all of the Hoover Hill, Tennille area, were fined \$100 each on vagrancy charges in the Justice Court of Thomas C. Hart, Tuesday.

The charges were brought in connection with an alleged raid on the turkey farm of Mabel Ward and Miriam Davis in the Hoover Hill district off Highway 42, according to the report of Sheriff O. T. Carter.

Shirley Scott and Hink, arrested by Sheriff Carter and Deputy Dick Baker after they had been apprehended at the scene by two local residents, were later released on \$500 bail, and they reportedly implicated the others, Sheriff Carter said.

The men, not appearing, but represented by their attorney, entered pleas of guilty to the charges of vagrancy, and all the fines were paid. In addition the defendants paid \$100 for each of the two turkeys and another \$100 for a turkey that was crippled, Sheriff Carter reported.

Overtime Parking Draws Warning From Police Head

Chief of Police Calvin Baird today announced that a clamp-down is to be made upon overtime parking in the city in all sections posted for limited parking.

Numerous complaints of persons continuing to feed the parking meters for periods longer than the posted times have come into the department, said Baird.

An officer has been delegated to marking cars at regular intervals, and citations will be issued to all overtime violators.

The chief stated he wished to give the people fair warning in advance. He said that in the past the parking situation has not been such as to require rigid enforcement, but during recent weeks, traffic and parking had increased to the point where it is necessary to enforce the parking rules.

Additional Funds to Be Asked for Marshall Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Foreign aid officials said today they expect to ask Congress for an extra \$1,200,000,000 to carry the Marshall Plan through April, May and June of next year.

The \$5,055,000,000 appropriation for European recovery will have been exhausted by the end of March—12 months after the program's start, a spokesman for the Economic Cooperation Administration reported privately.

Congress voted the recovery money for 15 months, or until the end of the federal fiscal year next June 30, but gave President Truman the power to let ECA use it up in 12 months if necessary.

Petrillo Ban On Music Records About to End

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The 10-month-old Petrillo order preventing the bulk of the country's musicians from making new phonograph recordings is about to be junked.

As a result, a backlog of hit tunes written since the first of the year will be available to the public on discs for the first time. The new records may be on store shelves within two weeks after the ban is lifted.

Most of the major companies and the AFL-American Federation of Musicians, headed by James C. Petrillo, have reached agreement on major terms of a new five-year recording contract.

Dr. R. E. Purvine Named As Medical Examiner

Torchlight Parade Will Mark Cordon Welcome

G. O. P. Rally At Armory To Hear Senator

Misspelling of Name On Ballot Will Not Affect Vote Count for Cordon

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Dinner guests will form the nucleus of the torchlight parade at the termination of the concert. The parade will "snowball" throughout the streets of Roseburg. Onlookers are invited to join the line of marchers as the parade passes by.

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Communism Check in Asia Vow of Dewey

Stronger Bonds With China Pledged; Scores 'Happy Thought' Jest

EN ROUTE WITH DEWEY TO BOSTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Speedy action to block the advance of Communism in Asia was pledged today by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey. Barnstorming his way toward Boston, the G. O. P. nominee left behind in Cleveland last night a promise that if he is elected, this country will strengthen its bonds with non-Communist China.

He also got assurance in Cleveland of support from Alvanley Johnston, head of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Dewey speaks in the Boston arena tonight on an unannounced subject. His talk will be broadcast (CBS) from 6 to 6:30 p. m. Pacific standard time.

Dewey's plug for quick aid to China was in line with the known feeling of some of his top advisers that the Soviets are being permitted—almost by default—to make great gains in Asia while the world's attention is centered on the Berlin blockade.

These advisers give some credence to the theory that it is a part of a Russian stall in Berlin to keep the world's eyes off Asia.

Dewey put some of this thought into words when he told an audience estimated at 13,000 persons which gave him an ovation in the

A split in the union ranks caused the strike to collapse without an agreement being reached on retroactive pay increases and pensions.

Sutherland Residents Protest Alleged Negligence of Copco In Remedying Power Outages

Complaint against the numerous power outages at Sutherland that result from burned out transformer fuses on power poles of the California Oregon Power Co., has been filed with the Public Utilities Commission by a group of Sutherland business men and home owners.

They charged that the company has "remained aloof" to the conditions stated in their complaint, and that the company does not employ a lineman in their city to perform the necessary maintenance to provide adequate power service to Sutherland's homes and businesses.

"The California Oregon Power Co. has made no apparent effort to remedy a condition which has existed for over a period of three years, and which impairs the health and welfare of our citizens and causes loss of property and business," the complaint reads.

Denmark Signs Up For Loan of \$25 Million

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Denmark today signed an agreement for a \$5,000,000 Marshall Plan loan from the Economic Cooperation Administration.

The money will be used to buy raw materials and industrial equipment, a joint announcement by ECA and the Export-Import Bank said.

Denmark thus became the first country to sign up for a repayable loan since ECA yesterday halted its program of recovery gifts to nine European countries until those nations signed loan agreements.

The terms were similar to those for the \$310,000,000 credit extended to the British earlier this week. Payments on the principal are to start in 1956 and continue for 35 years, with interest at 3 1/2 per cent, payable semi-annually starting in 1952.

Soviet Leader Raps Action At United Nations

U. S., Britain Refuse To 'Cooperate' With Soviet On Berlin Issue, Charge

MOSCOW, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Prime Minister Stalin accused the U. S., Britain and the so-called neutral states of the United Nations Security Council today of supporting a policy which can lead to the "unleashing of a new war."

The Soviet leader added, however, that the present international crisis "can only end in an ignominious failure on the part of the instigators of a new war."

Stalin answered a series of questions put to him by a reporter of Pravda, the Communist Party newspaper, on the Berlin controversy.

The Prime Minister criticized China, Canada, Colombia, Syria, Belgium and Argentina for their actions in the Security Council at Paris during the Berlin discussions. (These six nations attempted to mediate the big power quarrel over Berlin, but Russia vetoed their proposed compromise Monday.)

"Those gentlemen are obviously lending their support to a policy of aggression—to a policy of unleashing a new war," Stalin asserted.

"The point is," Stalin went on, "that the instigators of the aggressive policy of the United States of America do not consider themselves interested in agreement and cooperation with the U. S. S. R."

"They want not agreement and cooperation but talk about agreement and cooperation, in order

American Would Bring Twins Of Jap Wife To U. S.

SEATTLE, Oct. 28.—(AP)—A University of Washington sociology instructor, who married a Japanese woman while serving on the U. S. Naval staff in Japan two years ago, now seeks to bring his Japanese twin-stepdaughters to this country.

The War Relocation Authority permitted David Carpenter to bring his wife and their son, Gary, back to the United States. But her three-year-old daughters by a previous marriage, Telko and Yoshiko Higo, could not return with her. They are living with grandparents.

"I'm the only father they've ever known," Carpenter said today explaining the situation. "They never saw their father."

Their father, Capt. Ichiji Higo, commander of the Japanese Naval Station at Cantonment, was killed shortly after the Japanese surrender. Carpenter met his future wife, the daughter of a Japanese baron, while on naval staff duty as chief of the statistics division.

Carpenter's mother in St. Louis has persuaded Congressman Walter C. Foerster to submit a special House resolution in Congress to admit them, he said.

"I hope Congress will realize 3-year-old girls need a mother," Carpenter said. "My wife's happiness would be complete if the twins were with us."
