Finlay Field was the scene of increased activity on the part of the Roseburg Indians Wednesday, as Coach Cecil Sherwood put the Senior High griders through the flaming hoop in preparation for their Friday night football session at North Bend.

Strategy to be used against North Bend was the principal item on the afternoon drill agenda, with single wing and T-formation plays getting a lot of attention by the Indians. Passing attacks and heavy tackling work-outs filled out the balance of the hours-long practice session.

Bob Sanders, Indian quarterback, was back in gear, after being treated for a "strep" throat infection. He was able to work out some, but Sherwood said Archie Rutter would probably start in the quarterback slot this weekend. Another benchwarmer who will see some action against North Bend is Bob Seance. His hand is well on the way to recovery after having been broken nearly a month ago, but he won't play too much, until he has fully regained strength in the ailing member.

About Evenly Matched
Sherwood reports that both clubs are "pretty evenly matched," which should make for an interesting and close contest. North Bend uses an "orthodox defense," the senior high mentor said, and although the coast city club has had tough luck during the early part of the season, they have been "coming right along" more recently. Last week they beat Myrtle Point 13-7.

"The kids are looking good," Sherwood said of the Indian practice sessions, with special improvement noticed in particular members of the squad. Stan Cornutt, according to Sherwood, "has a monopoly in the kicking department up to now, and will perform in that capacity Friday."

Another lad showing a lot of improvement is Chester Rowe, reserve tackle, while Bill Van Horn has made an impressive showing in the halfback position. Van Horn started out in the line, and has had some trouble adjusting himself to the change, but the gridiron has sharpened his abilities considerably.

Jack Mathis' kickoffs and conversions have brought favorable comments from coach and fans alike. His extra point tries have been good "most of the time," Sherwood said.

In reflecting on the Cottage Grove game, the Indian mentor said "We didn't look bad—but our defense was very weak. We need a terrific amount of work in that department."

The Indian drill schedule for today lists defensive practice near the top—"in terrific amounts."

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 28.—(AP)—If Oregon and California finish the season in a tie for Pacific Coast Conference honors, a vote of 30 conference faculty members will decide who goes to the Rose Bowl.

Brutus Hamilton, athletic director of the University of California, said a tie does not mean Oregon automatically gets the Bowl bid. Only the event of a tie draw-vote among the faculty group will the Ducks get the nod. Rules state that in the event of a tie vote, the team which has not appeared in the Bowl for the greater number of years automatically gets the Pasadena train-ride.

A customer went into the bar's washroom and noticed a leak in the ceiling. But it wasn't water. It was Bourbon. He called Sullivan. The bar owner called the police.

And officer John Nyland found Patrick J. Flemming, a 23-year-old West Virginian who had found a trap door in the ceiling and decided he'd become a boarder for a while.

Nyland said Flemming would leave his perch every morning, pass out through the customers, take off for the day and return to the bar about 15 minutes before closing time. He'd go back to his perch, wait until everyone left and then come down and help himself to whatever he desired.

Flemming, now lodged in a different abode, the city jail, said: "I stayed there for a month—drunk good whiskey, too... slept on the floor... and lived good."

Nyland said, "he'd be in that bar yet if that whiskey bottle hadn't tipped over."

"Sure would. That was good whiskey," said Flemming.

He was booked on petty theft.

A call for a meeting of prospective charter members of a new Aerie of the Fraternal Order of Eagles which is being organized in Tri-City has been issued by Dr. H. B. Scofield, who was appointed by M. L. Brown of Kansas City, Grand Aerie organizer, as his deputy organizer for the F. O. E. The meeting will be held Friday Oct. 29 at Melody Barn Dance Hall.

Anyone interested in the Eagles is invited to attend the meeting. The organizer will explain the aims and benefits of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, and discuss the requirements for granting a charter for a new Aerie such as is proposed in Tri-City.
