**Doomed Slayer Survives Five Of Law's Officers**  
TACOMA, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Many a Pierce County official today was discussing with just a shade of seriousness what is no longer laughingly referred to as the "Jake Bird Hex."  
Shortly after Jake Bird was convicted of the axe murder of Mrs. Bertha Kludt here last fall and sentenced to hang, he was quoted as saying that "the guys who had anything to do with this case are going before I do."  
A few weeks later Superior Judge E. D. Hodge, who had conducted Bird's trial, died unexpectedly.  
Then Chief Deputy Clerk Ray Scott, who had handled filing of papers connected with the case died suddenly.  
Joe Karpach, Pierce County undersheriff who figured in the obtaining of many confessions of other crimes from Bird, succumbed to a heart ailment.  
Thursday Tacoma Police Lieut. Sherman Lyons, who also obtained a number of confessions from Bird—including the murder of Mrs. Kludt, died of a heart attack a few hours after finishing work.  
Jake is still very much alive; his appeal from his conviction is still being processed by the State Supreme Court. Today, is the first anniversary of the ax-slaying of Mrs. Kludt and her daughter, Beverly June.
