

**Locked-in Boy Rescued
From Burning Home**

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—(AP)—A 3-year-old boy was rescued yesterday from a blazing bedroom into which he had been locked.

Firemen said the blaze was accidentally started by a small brother, who lit a match in a closet to hunt his clothes, and dropped it. The fire smoldered and broke into flame after the youngster had left for school.

The rescued 3-year-old was Harold Strong. A neighbor at Gull Lake smelled the smoke and kicked down the locked door to bring the boy out.

Another neighbor Mrs. Wardenia Anderson, said the children's other had left them a month ago and that older brother had been trying to care for the 3-year-old. With no one at home to watch him, the little boy was locked inside to keep him from running astray.

The boy was turned over to juvenile authorities.

**Judge C. H. Combs
Will Preside At
Circuit Court Here**

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly announced today that Judge Charles H. Combs of Lakeview has been assigned by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court for Oregon for the opening days, probably the first week of the Circuit Court jury term for Douglas County starting Nov. 8.

Judge Wimberly said that neither he nor Judge Dal M. King of Myrtle Point could be in Roseburg on the opening date because of the illness of Judge G. F. Skipworth at Eugene and because of work to be taken care of at Toledo.

Judge King will take over the jury term work in the Lane County Circuit Court Nov. 8, replacing Judge Skipworth, and Judge Wimberly will have to spend part of the week at Toledo.

Judge Wimberly explained that he, Skipworth and King are assigned to this district and may alternate for court work, but when an outside judge is needed, it is necessary that the Chief Justice make an assignment.

The Circuit Court term in Lane County, originally scheduled to open Oct. 18, has been postponed until Nov. 8, the same date as that in Douglas County, because of Judge Skipworth's illness. The latter, however, will still be unable to take over his duties on the later date.

**Three More Nations Sign
Up for Recovery Loans**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Italy yesterday borrowed \$50,000,000 from the Economic Cooperation Administration, signing loan papers shortly after France had taken a \$170,000,000 credit and Norway a \$35,000,000 credit.

The Italian borrowing will finance the purchase of industrial machinery and equipment, ECA announced.

Norway will use the funds for the purchase of industrial equipment. The terms are substantially the same as those extended in earlier lending to Britain, Iceland, Denmark, Ireland and Sweden.

France will use its loan to buy industrial machinery, equipment and raw materials.
