

Roseburg Indians Post 26-6 Victory Over North Bend

The Roseburg Indians gained back their spark last night and trounced the North Bend Bulldogs, 26-6, on the latter's home field. The Roseburg line was outstanding and opened up gaping holes for the backfield to blast through.

Hugh Fretwell and Jerry Anderson played exceptional ball on the right side of the Roseburg line on defense. Anderson broke through the line more than once to dump a North Bend back behind the line of scrimmage, and Fretwell was in the pile each time. Frequent substitutions were made by Roseburg Coach "Cec" Sherwood in the third and fourth quarters and he used nearly his entire lineup.

Roseburg's first touchdown came early in the first quarter on a 90-yard power drive with Backs Bill Van Horn and Bob Scott hitting the huge holes made by the linemen, and Dale Bonebrake skirting the ends. Van Horn slashed through tackle for the touchdown. Captain Jack Mathis missed the conversion.

Roseburg then kicked off to the North Bend 30, and the Bulldogs sparked by Backs Beebe and Graham, drove to the Roseburg 20, before they were stopped by the powerful Roseburg forward wall.

North Bend Scores in First
Fans saw a revision of the old "statue of liberty" play when North Bend made its only touchdown. Halfback Beebe faded back to pass and Back Tom Graham, coming around behind him, took the ball and galloped around left end into the end zone untouched. Playing was even the remainder of the half, which ended 6-6.

The third quarter was all Roseburg's. The Indians kicked off to North Bend, who worked the ball to the 50-yard line and it looked as if the Bulldogs had started a drive. But Right Tackle Anderson crashed through the line to smother Beebe for a five-yard loss. Beebe then punted to Dale Bonebrake on the Roseburg 30.

Bill Van Horn and Bob Scott advanced the ball to the 41 on line plunges. Dale Bonebrake broke around left end and dodging would-be tacklers right and left, finally broke away for a 60-yard run and touchdown. The conversion was missed, leaving the score 12-6 for Roseburg.

North Bend again tried the statue of liberty play but fumbled back on its own 25-yard line. There Beebe lofted a beautiful 60-yard punt to the Roseburg 20, where Dale Bonebrake ran it to the 45. On line plays by Van Horn and Scott, plus a 20-yard gallop by Bonebrake, the Indians worked the ball to the 21-inch line as the third quarter ended. Bob Scott scored the touchdown on a line plunge as the fourth quarter began. Mathis conversion was good for a 19-6 score.

Bob Sconce, Roseburg guard, back in the lineup after a month's inactivity caused by a hand injury, kicked to North Bend's Hughes in the end zone, and he ran the ball back to the 21. The Bulldogs unleashed a desperate drive which advanced to the Roseburg 12, but here the Indians held and started their final touchdown drive. Long runs by Dale Bonebrake and Van Horn carried the ball to the Indians' 42. There, on a fake punt, Archie Butler, Roseburg quarterback, advanced to midfield. Van Horn and Scott, aided by an offside penalty against North Bend, carried the ball to the Bulldogs' 70. There Rutter threw a beautiful long pass to Halfback Van Horn who stood just a few yards from the end zone, then stepped over the line for the final score. Mathis again converted to end the game 26-6. A final North Bend drive was cut short by the gun.

Five in Douglas Get Dance Prizes From Sportsmen

The grand prize, a free trip to Alaska for two people, went to William Anderson, Portland. More than 100 persons were present at the dance in Portland where Joyce Davis, Miss Oregon for 1948, assisted in awarding the prizes.

Oregon Takes On Gaels; OSC Faces Michigan State

Whistle time saw four of the Northwest's Coast Conference football teams swing into action in their home ballparks this afternoon with both Oregon schools engaging in king-of-the-hill games and Washington State entertaining its arch-rival, Idaho.

Oregon's Websters, sniffing the scent of roses, took on the St. Mary's Gaels at Eugene in a tilt that will provide some comparative statistics. The Gaels were beaten by California, 20-0, earlier in the season. A more lopsided victory for Oregon would strengthen its bid for the Rose Bowl in the event of a season's end tie with California for the conference lead.

Oregon State played host to Michigan State at Corvallis in an interconference contest.

At Pullman, the Cougars and Vandals met for the 49th time. Not since 1926 has Idaho been able to beat the victory tom toms after meeting its Palous neighbor. One of the games in that 22-year span ended in a tie, the rest went to WSC.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Martin Camella, Salem, Ore., cowboy became the first casualty of the 1948 Grant National Livestock Exposition and Horse Show and Rodeo at its opening here last night.

Camella, riding a vicious Brahma bull, was thrown and mauled before the rodeo bull fighters could toll the animal away.

He was taken to a hospital suffering from a fractured jaw, head and body bruises and possible internal injuries.

After being distracted from his victim, the bull jumped a 7-foot safety fence and butted several other cowboys participating before finally being dragged from the arena.

Oakland Six Edges Out Sutherlin In B League Battle

The Oakland six upset the B league standings and the dope bucket by edging out Sutherlin, 33-28, in a fast-action gridiron contest at Sutherlin Friday afternoon.

Oakland took the kickoff and on the third down scored a touchdown on a pass from Dave Rice to Don Hopkins, who lateraled to Herb Hogan, who went across for the tally. Hopkins made the conversion good.

The second touchdown was made on an end run by Hopkins, with the help of superior blocking by his teammates. Hogan converted the extra point.

Hopkins passed to Bob Hill, who was standing in the end zone, for the third Oakland touchdown. At the end of the half, the score favored Oakland, 21-8.

The pay quickened in the second half, with Oakland's Herb Hogan returning the kickoff 80 yards for the fourth touchdown. Oakland's fifth and final tally came on an end run by Hogan in the third quarter.

Sutherlin scored a safety in the 1st half when Oakland player fell on the ball behind his own goal line. A pass to J. West was good for a tally, and Plueard's plunge through the line was good for six more Sutherlin points. Another pass play, this time to Plueard, was good for a touchdown, while an end run in the fourth quarter netted Sutherlin their fourth and final score.

Possession of native pheasant in closed season—\$29.50.

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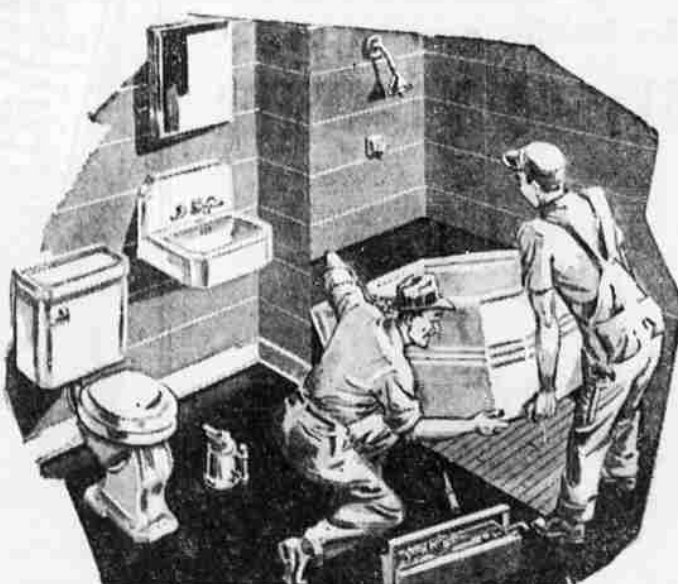


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
