

Saddler New King Of Feathers; Pep Kayoed in Fourth

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Willie Pep is all washed up after losing his featherweight championship to Sandy Saddler.

That seems to be the consensus following last night's stunning knockout win for Saddler, a Harlem speedster, in 2:38 of the fourth round. Pep never looked the part of the fighter who had lost only once in 136 previous starts.

Slow to move and an easy target for Saddler's fast left uppercut, Willie went down and out for the first time in his illustrious career. He had been on the deck twice before he took the full count by Referee Ruby Goldstein.

Saddler, up to now a prelin fighter in the Garden but a main go boy elsewhere around the globe, was hitting faster and sharper than ever before in a local ring. All the way he carried the battle to the fading champion.

Sandy is 22 years old, stands five-eight and weighs 124 pounds. Pep was his 94th opponent and his 64th knockout victim. He has lost six fights since he turned pro in 1944.

Straw Votes Lean Heavily to Dewey

Presidential polls were leaning heavily in Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's favor as the campaign neared its close, but significance of the surveys is discounted by Democratic spokesmen.

Results of the latest newspaper polls in the presidential race, including the candidate each newspaper is supporting, are as follows:

Cleveland Plain Dealer (supporting Dewey)—Public opinion poll taken in city of Cleveland based on 2,050 ballots: Truman, 54 per cent; Dewey, 39; Wallace, 7.

Chicago Tribune (supporting Dewey)—Straw vote of 62 downstate Illinois cities: Truman, 9,853 votes; Dewey, 14,749. City of Chicago, Truman, 14,998 votes; Dewey, 13,852.

Chicago Sun-Times (supporting Truman)—Straw votes of Chicago: Truman, 12,287 votes; Dewey, 10,895. Chicago suburbs: Truman, 2,264 votes; Dewey, 4,491. Downstate Illinois (33 of 101 counties) Truman 6,944 votes;

Dewey, 9,850. Fort Lauderdale (Fla.) Daily News (supporting Dewey)—Reader poll: Dewey, 71.2 per cent; Truman, 16; Thurmond, 12.4; Thurmond, 12.4; Wallace, 4. New York Daily News (supporting Dewey)—Statewide: Truman, 44.2 per cent; Dewey, 49.2; Wallace, 6.6.

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Community Chest Indispensable In Welfare Services

"Everybody Gives" is the continuing theme of the Community Chest campaign this year. The attention of all people is directed to the campaign for funds in Douglas County to be used to carry along the work of character building and welfare agencies throughout the state.

"Most of the agencies," declared Benton O. Wilson, campaign chairman of the Roseburg and Douglas County Community Chest, "are broad community services to be used and enjoyed by everyone."

"Relief of actual destitution is now carried chiefly by public social agencies supported by tax funds. The voluntary health and welfare services have an equally great responsibility—to make life fuller, happier, more worth living. In order to render this vital service they must have adequate funds."

The funds for these agencies, and among them is the Oregon Community Chest with its 11 participating agencies, are derived chiefly from the Community Chests over the state. Therefore the Chest campaign is not just another cam-

paign. It is not just one agency—it is many agencies united in one great appeal, Wilson pointed out.

This federation of campaigns means: Order and planning are substituted for chaos of competitive appeals; more people hear about the work of the agencies; contributors are protected from constant and unrelated appeals to their generosity. Waste of the time of leaders and workers is eliminated. Costs of campaigns are reduced. The community is assured better social planning without duplication of services; funds raised are fairly allocated.

Majority of U.S. Press Supporting Governor Dewey

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, Republican nominee, has the support of 771 newspapers or 65.17 per cent of the nation's dailies in his bid for the presidency, Editor & Publisher said today.

The trade publication's findings, based on a recently-completed poll, include these results: President Truman has the support of 182 papers or 15.36 per cent of the dailies. These represent 10.03 per cent of the country's total circulation. The newspapers backing Dewey have 78.55 of the total circulation.

Gov. J. Strom Thurmond, States' Rights candidate, is backed by 45 dailies—or 3.8 per cent of the total. They have a circula-

tion of 587,730, or 1.31 per cent, in 13 Southern States.

Henry Wallace, Progressive party candidate, is supported by three newspapers, or .25 per cent. They have .13 per cent of the total circulation.

Editor & Publisher compared the support figures to the 1944 campaign when, it said, Dewey had the endorsement of 60.1 per cent of the dailies with 68.5 per cent of the circulation, compared to 22 per cent support, or 17.7 per cent on a circulation basis, for Roosevelt.

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
