ATTENTION: VOTERS OF DOUGLAS COUNTY

Go To The Polls. Vote in The General Election Nov. 2

Your attention is herein called to two measures of great significance to the welfare of the public school system of the state which will appear on this ballot. One of them is the Constitutional Amendment Fixing Qualifications of Voters in School Elections, Official Ballot Number 308. Your attention is invited to the argument appearing in the Official Voters' Pamphlet.

The other is the measure entitled Constitutional Six Per Cent Tax Limitation Amendment, Ballot Number 300. This amendment should be approved. In Douglas County, population, assessed valuations, and operating costs have increased tremendously during the last six years, yet school boards, city councils, county courts, etc., have been hampered with an inadequate tax base that placed the future tax revenues on an unknown and uncertain basis. The law as it now exists does not provide for an increase in the tax base through an affirmative vote of the taxpayers. The base can be raised only 6 per cent per year by board and budget committee action, and at this rate it will take twenty years or more in many instances before an adequate tax base can be established. By then different conditions will probably exist.

The proposed amendment does not in itself provide higher taxes. It merely provides that when a tax base is too small to meet existing conditions, the taxpayers are given the power to vote, if they so desire, a more realistic and adequate base. If and when expenses level off, the base will automatically become lower. Thus there will be sounder financing of our schools, cities, counties, etc., during periods of great change in population and economic trends. School boards, budget committees, etc., can with greater assurance plan sound financing on the basis of known future revenues.

The late Governor Earl Snell's tax study commission, after studying the matter for two years recommends approval of this Constitutional Six Per Cent Tax Limitation Amendment.
