Taylor, Salem, secretary of the Men's Garden Clubs of America, Inc., will be guest speaker at the Roseburg Women's Club meeting to be held Wednesday, November 3, at one-thirty o'clock in the parlors of the First Methodist Church. Guest artist will be Mrs. Wendell Johnson, violinist, accompanied by Mrs. Homer W. Grow.

Mr. Taylor is Accident Analyst for the State Highway Department and states that he is personally not a horticulturist, but just a plain everyday, amateur backyard gardener. He reports that all of his knowledge on gardening has been derived from meetings of the garden club and he says that his enthusiasm for the Men's Garden Clubs of America is in appreciation for the great value he has derived from association with the Salem Men's Garden Club.

His topic for discussion is "Why Men Garden," in which he will point out why gardening is an inherent trait of men and how and why they can develop a genuine love for it.

The Men's Garden Clubs of America is a national organization of men's garden clubs, of which there are nine clubs in Oregon: Portland, Albany, Corvallis, McMinnville, Newberg, Grants Pass, Coos Bay, Newport and Salem, comprising some 1000 enthusiastic amateur male gardeners. 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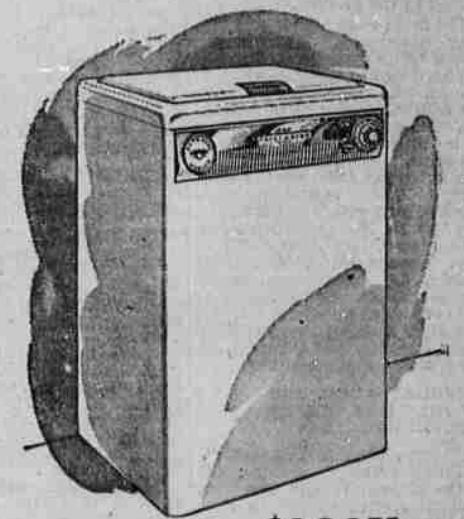

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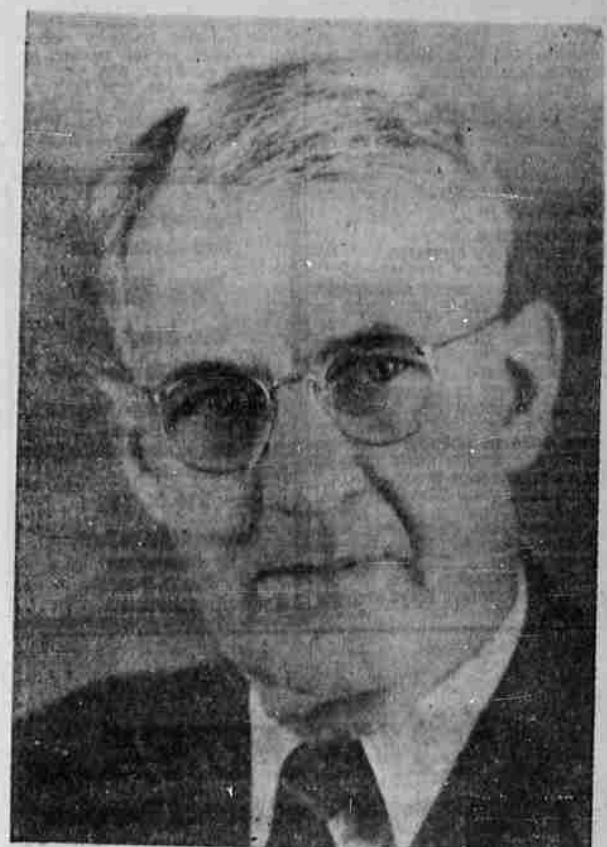
