

14 Major River Basins Slated For Pollution Control

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The Public Health Service said today it will establish a water-pollution control office in each of the 14 major river basins.

The first of these is already in operation at Kansas City for Missouri and parts of adjoining states, the agency said.

Four others, each handling two or more states, will be organized before the end of the year.

They are offices for the Pacific Northwest, at Portland, Ore.; the upper Mississippi basin, probably at St. Louis; the Great Lakes

basin (site not yet chosen); and the Ohio-Tennessee basin, probably at Cincinnati.

Congress last June approved a national program to assist states, municipalities, interstate agencies and industries in control of water pollution from sewage and industrial wastes.

It authorized these sums: \$22,500,000 a year for five years to cover loans for planning and building sewage treatment facilities, with no individual loan to exceed \$250,000, or one-third the cost of the project.

\$1,000,000 a year for five years, covering grants for preparing project plans, no grant to exceed \$20,000, or one-third the cost of such work.

\$1,000,000 a year for five years to cover grants for research and investigation on industrial wastes.
