

## Arkansas Jones Beats Rufus; Fox Defeats Kneilson

A capacity crowd saw Farmer Jones and Billy Fox each dispose of their opponents, Rufus Jones and Stocky Kneilson, respectively, in rough and tumble matches that had the fans screaming for "Puddin' Heads" and the Swede's scamp more than once. The farmer and Fox each won by taking two out of three falls in scheduled one-hour duels.

The main event got off to a lightning start as Rufus came across the ring even before the bell sounded to tangle with the Farmer. Referee Elton Owen grabbed Rufus and managed to get him over to the corner and to wait for the bell.

Before the bell had died Rufus came across the ring, but the Farmer was down on all fours. The Arkansas pig-farmer let go with a mule-kick that sent Rufus to the mat stunned and subdued. The Farmer easily pinned him with body press, taking the first fall in one of the quickest times seen around Roseburg in many a day.

The next fall saw both matmen put on a demonstration of unorthodox wrestling, with Farmer using his legs to flip Rufus around the ring like a wet sack. Both men got carried away and traded punches in the center of the ring. But with all of Farmer's bag of tricks, involving the use of his educated legs, Rufus managed to take the second fall with head butts followed up with a body press.

The crowd got carried away in the third fall when Rufus took Farmer's belt and attempted to wrap it around the Arkie's neck. Owen got in the tuckus and lost his shirt in the resulting scramble. Rufus tossed the pig-farmer out of the ring and attempted to keep him there, but with Owen's help, Farmer got back in and soon had the Detroit black boy in position for another mule-kick, which ended the fight in favor of Farmer Jones.

The preliminary proved equally rugged with Kneilson and Fox performing the mat chores. Fox took the first fall by bouncing off the ropes with such force the top strand parted from one of the posts. Fox hit Kneilson in the breadbasket, knocking the wind

out of the Swede, and making him easy bait for a body press. Fox and the Swede traded holds in the second fall with each gaining the advantage from time to time. But this time it was Fox's turn to scream, as Kneilson applied a painful arm stomp and vertical arm-bar. Fox gave up and the Swede took the fall. Fox got his dander up as Kneilson continually used "meanie" tactics—first pulling his opponent's hair, then punching him with a fist. In the third fall, Fox challenged the Swede by putting up his dukes, but Owen calmed him. The ex-marine took the match on a referee's decision, when Kneilson continued to foul, finally dropping a knee on Fox's neck, when the latter was in prone position.

## Glide Wins Over Coos River, 12-8

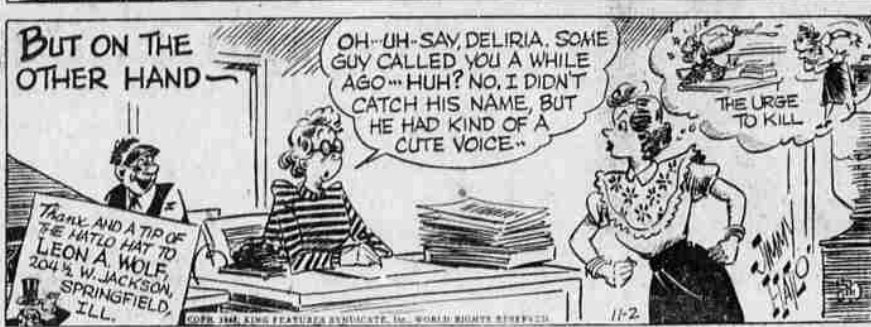

## Two Passes By Van Brocklin Give U. of O. Victory

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 1.—(AP)—Oregon's Norm Van Brocklin came up with two passes against St. Mary's here Saturday to save the day and give the Ducks a 14-13 victory over the Gaels.

The Gaels were holding a 13-7 edge late in the first quarter when the Oregon quarterback unleashed the aerials. With but three minutes and five seconds left in the game, Van Brocklin tossed a long one to Dick Wilkins, who reached the St. Mary's 13. The next toss fell incomplete, but the third rocketed 13 yards over center and Wilkins snatched it and reached paydirt.

Chet Daniels' kick was good and the extra point stood as the margin of victory. A crowd of 12,000 watched the Gaels surprise the Ducks in the earlier quarters. St. Mary's right halfback Glen Ball started what came close to an upset when he plunged over right tackle in the second period. This was countered by Oregon before the half when Johnny McKay raced 37 yards and Daniels kicked the extra point for a thin Oregon lead. A fumble in the third period by McKay set up the Gaels' 13-7 edge that stood until the final minutes. Bell went over again after moving in eight plays from Oregon's 39. Braddica's kick was good.

## California, Oregon Neck and Neck in Rose Bowl Race

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Football's dizzy scramble out this way for the Rose Bowl continued apace today.

As the race turned into the November stretch run, California and Oregon were neck and neck. They may hit the wire that way. A playoff, unprecedented in Coast Conference history, would then be the logical solution. The usual selective method of voting may cause hard feelings this year in case of an Oregon-California deadlock at the finish.

The California Bears cleared their toughest hurdle last week, the 13-7 win over Southern California Trojans who were storming at the end. The undefeated Bears were glad to get out of it with whole skins. Their record is unblemished, in and out of the league.

California, with U. C. L. A., Washington State and Stanford coming up in turn, should go all the way from here. Unless, of course, the vastly improved and improving Stanford eleven starts the revolution in the season's finale, Nov. 20.

**Close Call for Oregon**  
The Oregon Ducks, also holding a clean conference slate, had to charge from behind to nose out the fighting St. Mary's Gaels, 14-13. The winning action took place in the last two minutes of the game.

For Oregon, the remaining schedule offers Washington, U. C. L. A. and Oregon State. The Ducks, like their Rose Bowl rivals, California, should travel the victory highway. Their great rival, Oregon State, could prove the stumbling block, Nov. 20.

California comes back home this week to take on U. C. L. A. The latter has been somewhat of a conference punching bag but may perk up after beating Nebraska, 27-15, in an interconference engagement back at Lincoln.

Oregon goes to Seattle to meet Washington, now wallowing in three successive losses without scoring a point. Washington's 20-0 setback by Stanford last week was surprising by its one-sided attack but no goal line punch.

The win was a good one for Stanford's Indians. They go to New York this week-end for a game with Army. Don't sell Stanford too short. Plenty of confidence has been added.

**Nevada Eleven Stars**  
Oregon State and Washington State clash on the latter's field. Anything can happen in this one.

While Oregon State was losing to visiting Michigan State, 21-46, last week, Washington State was winning closely from Idaho, 19-14. This week-end may prove just how strong the University of Nevada really is. It meets Santa Clara, Sunday at Sacramento.

Undeclared Nevada is the highest scoring major team in the nation, even if it hasn't played a major schedule. Last week's 79-13 win over Oklahoma City College surpassed the 65-14 victory over University of Tulsa the Saturday before.
