Mrs. Vern Holgate, entered Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene Wednesday for medical treatment. Mrs. Harry Barker will

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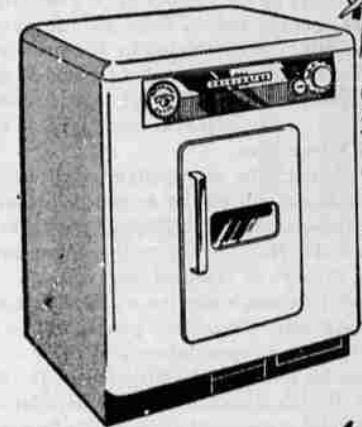
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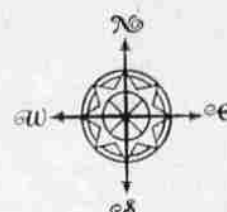
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
