Mrs. Dora M. Schmidt, 80, 421 Pitzer St., died after a lingering illness Tuesday. She was born May 23, 1868, in Bremen, Germany, and came to the United States in March, 1904.

PREFER JUNGLES

HAMBURG, Germany.—(AP)—Thousands of Germans are so eager to leave Europe they will face wild animals to do so. Two small advertisements in local Ruhr papers asking for men for two big game expeditions brought thousands of replies. Expedition leader Gustav Hahnke said 85 per cent were from people "jumping at a chance to turn their backs on Europe."

He only wants 22 men for each of the expeditions. But in a few days there were over 3,000 applicants. Emil Wacker, owner of the German "Apollo" circus, hopes to send the two expeditions next year to the Congo and the Amazon. He wants to bring back elephants, tigers and snakes for German circuses and zoos.

TRAPPER'S BODY FOUND

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 3.—(AP)—A trapper yesterday stumbled on the body of Claude Everett Haskins, 46-year-old Klamath man missing since last March 18.

Haskins, a trapper, failed to return from running his lines in swamp land near Lake Ewauna, where his body was found yesterday by Fred Hewley of Troutdale, here for the trapping season.

Roadman Gives Congratulations To Winning Rival

County Commissioner H. B. Roadman announced this morning that he conceded his defeat to Deputy Sheriff R. G. (Dick) Baker. He congratulated the winner as he received early-morning returns showing that Baker held a substantial lead in most county precincts.

A county official 12 years in office. He had won the Republican nomination at the primary election last May in a contest with three other candidates. Baker is a newcomer to politics, although he has served as a deputy sheriff. He previously was an automobile salesman.

Roadman said he would give the commissioner-elect his support and expressed the belief that he would be "a good commissioner."

Roadman had based his own campaign on his "experience" in the office, and on the County Court's timber sale policy, which he has had a part in developing; on the road program and on the county's recovery from a warrant system of financing.

Baker said he was "not surprised" at the outcome of the election. He expressed his appreciation of the persons who gave him support. He attributed this in part to the friendships he made during his years as an automobile salesman.

With Baker's election as county commissioner, a Democrat once more will be returned to the County Court. Since Lynn V. Beckley's defeat of J. Ross Hutchinson two years ago, the court has been all Republican.

Services in charge of the Roseburg Funeral Home will be held Thursday, Nov. 4, at 1 p.m. in the Presbyterian Church in Glendale, with the Rev. J. K. Howard officiating. Interment will follow in the Canvonne Cemetery.

Balloting was reported to be heavy in all precincts of the county. It was expected that the completed returns today would establish a record vote. At several polling places yesterday evening, people stood in line waiting their turn to vote before the close of the polls at 8 o'clock.

Because of the heavy vote and the complicated ballot, tabulation of returns was delayed at most precincts until midnight or after. Nineteen precincts, including three Roseburg city precincts, had not yet reported their returns after 8 o'clock this morning.

Newbury proved to be the voters' favorite, leading the entire ticket in his re-election to head the state department. He rolled up 106,908 votes to 44,828 for Byron G. Carney, Milwaukee Democrat, as the two-thirds mark passed. Newbury was appointed to the job only a year ago.

Belton was elected treasurer by a safe margin over Walter J. Pearson, Portland Democrat. He will succeed State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott, Portland, who is serving his second term and thus was ineligible for re-election.

Attorney General George Neuner, McMinnville Republican who wouldn't even bother to campaign, held a big lead for re-election. He defeated William B. Murray, Portland.

All Congressmen Safe

First District—Rep. Walter Norblad, Astoria Republican who has served almost three years, was re-elected 2 to 1. He defeated Edward E. Gideon, Salem Democrat. Theodore Walcott, Yamhill Progressive, trailed badly.

Second District—Rep. Lowell Stockman, Pendleton Republican, was re-elected to a fourth term. His margin over C. J. Shorb, LaGrande Democrat, was 10 to 7.

Third District—Rep. Homer D. Angell, Portland, dean of Oregon's congressional delegation, was elected to his fifth term. He defeated Democrat Roland C. Bartlett almost 2 to 1, and had seven times as many votes as Peggy T. Carlson, Progressive.

Fourth District—Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg Republican, won his fourth term. His margin over William F. Tanton, Jasper Democrat, was better than 2 to 1.

The three State Supreme Court justices up for re-election won without opposition. They are Justices Percy R. Kelly, James T. Brand and Harry H. Belt.

cast during the hours the polls were open would constitute a legal election, or whether, if the polls were open longer, enough additional votes would be cast to alter the outcome.

The city council will meet, Thursday at 5:30 p. m., at the City Hall, to canvass the votes and to certify the election. A period of 30 days must elapse before the areas can officially be brought into the city.

D. S. Houser, chairman of the West Roseburg election board, said his board had not "refused" to accept the annexation ballots.

He said "the members did not know anything about the ballots" until they were brought to the polling place by city officials at 9 o'clock.

Houser said he called County Clerk Roy Agee, who informed him the election board was not required to handle the extra ballots. City officials should have contacted each member of the

board to ask if he would consent to count the ballots, Houser said he was told by Agee.

He pointed out that the West Roseburg precinct includes 931 registered voters, about 300 more than at the primary election in May. Since not all of these voters were eligible to vote in the annexation election, precinct workers would have had to take time to determine the eligibility.

Extra Board Forced To Move

When City Recorder William E. Bollman learned yesterday morning that the annexation ballots would not be handled by the regular board, he arranged with the city attorney and the city manager to swear in a special board. This board functioned in the regular polling place until requested to leave by a deputy sheriff.

Houser pointed out that the quarters, in the basement of Anderson's Grocery, 1570 Harvard Ave., were crowded and with a record vote expected, the extra board functioning in the polling place only added to the congestion and confusion.

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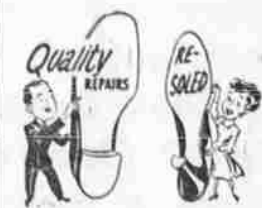
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
