**Youth Recreation
Top Activity Of
Salvation Army**

An extensive youth, social, and religious program is carried on in Roseburg, by the Salvation Army, one of four local agencies supported by the Roseburg and Douglas County Community Chests.

Now in the midst of its annual fund raising effort, the Community Chest also supports, in part, the Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, and the Y. M. C. A., new member agency of the Chest this year.

Funds raised for the Salvation Army go toward such character-building activities as a teen-age boys' basketball team, brass and string bands, handicraft classes, and a girl guards organization now being formed.

Full-time directors of the Salvation Army here are Capt. and Mrs. Claude Bowden, who have the assistance of Adjutant and Mrs. David Swanson, retired officers of the Army.

Last winter and spring, Capt. Bowden coached the boys' basketball team, which met other Salvation Army squads from Klamath Falls, Coos Bay, Eugene, Salem, and Portland. For lack of a local gymnasium, games were played at the Wilbur School.

When the building project at the Salvation Army's new home on Winchester Street is finished, complete recreational facilities will be available, including a gymnasium.

So far this year, the Salvation Army has furnished meals and room to 229 persons stranded for funds while passing through the city. These persons were given 43 pairs of shoes and 401 articles of clothing. The local Salvation Army corps also assisted in the Columbia River flood and stands by for any emergency.

Other services which the Salvation Army renders, through its facilities in Portland, include the home and hospital for girls and the social service center for men. Persons in Douglas County may apply for admittance to these institutions through the Salvation Army in Roseburg. The Portland agencies receive support through the Oregon Chest, for which funds are also being collected locally.

The Salvation Army also has a missing persons bureau able to make inquiries throughout the world, and carries on prison and hospital work.

Frankfurt, Germany, Nov. 3.—(P)—A former general who fled from the Russians said yesterday a "people's police force" formed recently in the Soviet zone "is the first stage of a Red Army manned by Germans."

The former officer, Maj. Gen. Walter Schreiber, told a news conference this force would pose a potential threat to the Western Zones of Germany if the Allied occupation forces withdrew. The Russians have suggested such a withdrawal.

Schreiber, wartime general of Berlin, said he had been offered the post of "chief of sanitation in the Soviet Zone within the organization of the police force," but refused it.

He said Kurt Fischer, minister of the interior in the Soviet Zone, told him and five other generals personally that the "people's police" would be armed with tanks and artillery. He said four of the generals agreed to take part in it.

British and American authorities have estimated the strength of the force at from 200,000 to 300,000 men.

National Guard Revives Pre-War Inactive Unit

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(P)—The National Guard today revived its pre-war inactive branch to help build up a trained manpower reserve.

Maj. Gen. Kenneth F. Cramer, chief of the Army's National

Guard Bureau, said officers and enlisted men unable to continue active training with their state units can retain guard status by transfer to the non-drilling group.

Men will be enlisted in the inactive National Guard for only one three-year term.

Draft-age guardsmen who shift to the inactive branch will become eligible for a regular army call-up, Cramer pointed out.

Members of the inactive National Guard will be attached to state headquarters for potential future active assignments.

Vegetarian Party Sure Of One Vote—Its Candidate

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—(P)—The Vegetarian party's presidential candidate, Dr. John Maxwell of Chicago, made sure of one vote in yesterday's election—his own.

The 86-year-old bearded operator of a vegetarian restaurant had to write in his name because his party is not on the ballot. But he wasn't preplexed about the possibility of working up meatless menus for the White House table because of his own.

1. He's sure he won't get enough votes.

2. He was born in Kent, England, and thus is constitutionally barred from becoming president.

Maxwell said that if he could be elected, his first official act would be to sponsor legislation outlawing raising of food for cattle. "This," he said, "would solve the world's hunger problem."

REDS SALVAGE STEEL

BERLIN.—(P)—The Russians, who have already removed the marble from Hitler's ruined Reichschancellery, are now taking its steel ceiling struts.

The pink marble from chancellery walls and granite from its foundation was used in construction of huge Red Army war memorials. The steel is to be used in construction of a theater at Karlshorst, headquarters of the Soviet military administration.

BOY PREACHER POPULAR

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn.—(P)—A 12-year-old Negro, son of a barbershop porter here, is receiving invitations to preach from churches all over the country. He is Howard Chubb, a student at junior high school. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Elijah Chubb.

The child preacher has delivered sermons at Knoxville, Tenn., Cleveland, Ohio, and Indianapolis, Ind. W. W. "Vic" pastor of the West side Baptist Church, where the youth is a member, says he receives daily requests from many cities for the boy to preach.

**Tighter Power
Supply Starts
Northwest Pinch**

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(P)—The Pacific Northwest is beginning to feel the pinch of a tight electric power supply and even private interests in the industry are urging speed expansion of government facilities in that area.

The water supply situation is good but government and private power plants are working full blast to meet a tremendous demand.

Frank McLaughlin, president of Puget Sound Power and Light Co., talked about what he termed "a very critical" situation while visiting New York.

He said added capacity is needed badly. Since the government is the principal supplier of power in the area, he said immediate expansion of the government hydro projects is necessary.

The power industry's trade organization—Edison Electric Institute—forecast a tight nationwide situation just recently and said the margin between peak loads and maximum capacity would be very small.

The Pacific Northwest is feeling the pinch a little earlier than expected.

Peak loads for the Pacific Northwest power suppliers usually come in December, January and February. But McLaughlin says it looks as though there would have to be some shifting and adjustment of industrial loads very soon. There would have to be an adjustment of industrial

operations to shift some of the demand from peak hours, he said. McLaughlin said the aluminum industry is "using about one-half the government-produced power from such projects as Bonneville and Coulee. And, he added, the industry could use more."

There are no idle plants in the area, McLaughlin said, and added capacity through added government facilities is the indicated answer to the situation.

Puget Sound power officials appeared before congressional committees as long ago as 1st April to urge adequate federal appropriations to insure a continuity of supply.

And since the government is the area's main supplier, Puget Sound feels added government facilities should be speeded up.

Gas Fumes Take Lives Of 3 Small Children

SALINAS, Calif., Nov. 3.—(P)—Three small children were asphyxiated by fumes from a gas heater yesterday.

The victims, Angel, 2, Ophelia, 3, and Rosalie, 1, were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Angel Hernandez of nearby Soledad.

Coroner Elmer Machado reported that Hernandez told him he had installed the heater "yesterday but all the vents had not been put in place."

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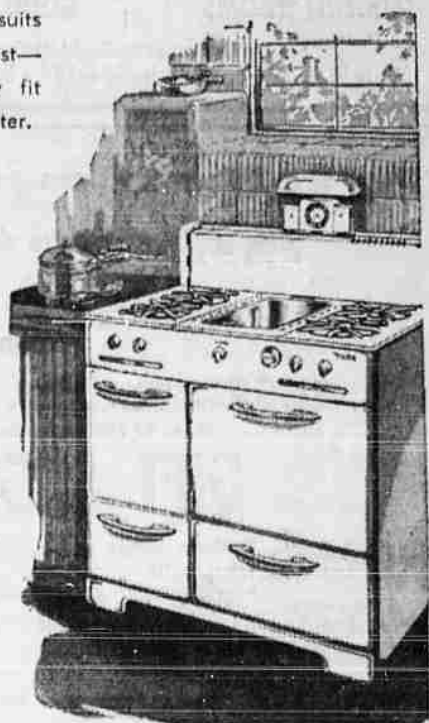
