FIRST AGAIN: Cavalcade, Mrs. Dodge Sloan's great 3-year-old, won the American Derby by 2 1/4 lengths over Discovery, to take the \$25,000 purse. Cavalcade is the first horse to win both the Kentucky Derby and the American Derby since Spokane captured the dual derbies in 1889.

Tojo, 24 Others Found Guilty of Aggressive War

TOKYO, Nov. 5 — (AP) — Japan yesterday was convicted of waging aggressive wars against China, Russia, Britain, the United States and other western powers. The conviction by the International Military Tribunal for the Far East came in the long trial of former Premier Hideki Tojo and 24 co-defendants on war crimes charges. They looked sleepy as reading of the judgment began.

The court narrowed down the issue to these questions: Was Japan guilty of waging aggressive war in violation of international treaties? Were the 25 defendants responsible for making and carrying out these policies? Were the defendants responsible for crimes against humanity and violations of the laws of war?

Militarists and their supporters, the court held, seized control of Japan's government. They, the tribunal found, provoked war through the Manchurian conquest of 1931, and the full scale war against China that began on July 7, 1937.

Hour after hour Sir William Webb of Australia, president of

the tribunal, read the judgment, which runs 1,575 pages; it may be 10 days before the last defendant knows his fate.

Poet, Two Scientists Given Nobel Prizes

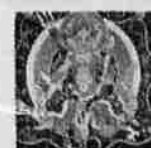
STOCKHOLM, Nov. 5 — (AP) — T. S. Eliot, American-born British poet and dramatist, won the 1948 Nobel prize for literature yesterday. A Briton won the physics prize while the award for chemistry went to a Swedish scientist. Patrick M. S. Blackett, British nuclear physicist from Manchester University, won the physics award for his development of the Wilson method of studying the courses of radioactive particles and his discoveries in cosmic radiation.

Prof. Arne Tiselius, Swedish biochemist, won the chemistry prize for his development of two methods for biochemical study of proteins, enzymes and other substances.

The prizes are worth the equivalent of \$44,000 each. The Nobel peace prize winner, still to be selected, will be chosen
