

Circuit Court To Open Monday; New Judge to Preside

The November term of the Douglas County Circuit Court is scheduled for opening Monday at 10 a. m. with Judge Charles H. Combs, Lakeview, presiding in the temporary absence of Judge Carl E. Wimberly. The latter is scheduled at Toledo part of next week, but will return to complete the court term.

With 12 civil cases, together with several criminal cases on the docket, one of the longest court terms of recent years is expected. The first case, scheduled to be called up Monday is the Lee Spear vs. Lela Deane McNeill and Robert Lee McNeill suit. The plaintiff in the original complaint seeks judgment against the defendant in one action for \$125 as wages alleged due between May 16, 1947, and July 13, 1947, for digging a well, siding a house with brick paper, and having. In a second action, the plaintiff seeks judgment for \$33.20 for building materials allegedly sold the defendant July 19, 1947, and in the third action to recover \$1,740 allegedly loaned the defendant to secure a loan on the defendant's property in Xenia.

The second case up for hearing will be the Associated Timber Company, Inc. vs. J. E. R. D., and A. F. Stearns and Ray Collett, doing business as Stearns Hardware and Implement Company, asking damages for \$2500 for the alleged "wrongful" conversion by the defendants for their own use of one towing winch, one dozer drum and one dozer blade.

The principal criminal case will be the State vs. Elmer Jesse Moser, as the first defendant to be tried for the alleged murder of Willis Moffitt, against whom the Grand Jury has returned an indictment. This case is scheduled to open Nov. 15, and the case against the second defendant, Francis Stanley White, will be called Nov. 29.

Several new jurors have been summoned by the Judge, to round out the jury roster.

Slayer of Two Wives Loses Property Suit

SEATTLE, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Roscoe Lee Hayton, who admitted slaying two of his three wives, lost a legal contest Thursday over possession of property of one of them.

Superior Judge James T. Ronald cancelled the deeds by which Hayton gained title to a \$20,000 Seattle house and lot. It had belonged to his third wife, Ellen Buckingham Coyne Hayton, to whose body in Skagit County near Mount Vernon Hayton led officers last January. She was killed last Jan. 28.

Hayton now is serving a life term in the state prison for the killing of his second wife, Sarah Alice Hayton, in Mason County in 1945. He never was tried for the death of his third wife.

Judge Ronald ruled that the deeds to the Seattle property should be turned over to Mrs. Hayton's sister, Mrs. Edna B. Raborn, administratrix of her estate. It is to be for the benefit of 16-year-old Jack Coyne, her son by a previous marriage.

One of the casualties was Louise Moore, who looked out a window of her home opposite the gunman's room as the shooting began. A bullet struck her in the head. She was reported in critical condition at Chester hospital.

At the hospital the dead were identified as: Purnsley, Casino, Peter Parker, Edward Boyer, Samuel Hill, 45, James Simon, 41, and Samuel Barrage Slays Killer.

City and state police quickly converged on the scene after the shooting began and Chief Desmond ordered all reserves mobilized.

The officers, firing rifles, sub-machineguns and tear gas, poured bullets into the barricaded room. Witnesses said they were unable to tell during the shooting whether the trapped man returned the fire.

Terrified residents of the neighborhood peered from their homes or skulked from door to door as the barrage continued for more than a half hour.

Then Desmond and other officers, covered by the weapons of police posted at strategic spots around the building, pushed cautiously up the stairs and into the gunman's room. They found him dead in the bedroom.

Good Offer for Plant at Springfield Expected

That an "adequate offer" will be received by the government in the sale or lease of the Wilamette Valley Wood Chemical Co. plant at Springfield "appears likely," Rep. Harris Ellsworth said he was informed today by the War Assets Administration.

Application of the national security clause to the government alcohol plant will assure that it will not be dismantled or removed, Ellsworth said. The WAA has promised it shall "try very hard" to see that the plant is sold or leased on conditions that guarantee its completion and continued operation.

Drunken Driver Fined \$120 on Three Charges

Charles Henry Root, Roseburg, arraigned in Municipal Court before Judge Ira B. Riddle Saturday morning, pleaded guilty to charges of drunk driving, having no operator's license and driving with void California license plates.

He paid a \$100 fine on the drunk driving count, \$10 each on the other two counts, and his driver's license was suspended for one year.

Would Ban Use of Mails To Political Polls

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Rep. Simpson, Illinois Republican, said yesterday he is going to ask the next Congress to deny use of the mails to presidential polls.

The bill he proposes also would prohibit the use of the mails for polls on senatorial and Congressional races.

Virtually all polls on Tuesday's elections picked Gov. Thomas E. Dewey to defeat President Truman—and missed badly.

Simpson said polls "exert a certain bandwagon psychology that is not in the best interest of the country." He added in a statement: "I don't believe the people like to have their minds made up for them."

Dock Strikers To Consider Proposal OK'd by Employers

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Harry Bridges summoned his CIO longshoremen — key union in the West Coast maritime strike — to a meeting today to consider an employer-approved proposal to end the 66-day shipping tieup.

The program was framed by Almon E. Roth, president of the San Francisco Employers Council, and would sidestep the issue of whether the leadership of Bridges and Hugh Bryson, head of the CIO Marine Cooks and Stewards, is "irresponsible." The Waterfront Employers Association and the shipowners have said that it was and refused to reopen negotiations with the two. Yesterday they reportedly agreed to Roth's plan.

Reliable waterfront sources gave this picture of the Roth pattern:

- 1. It includes only the basis for reopening negotiations and administering new contracts. It does not concern contract terms. 2. The Employers' Council and the National CIO would be party to the negotiations and would underwrite the peace.

"Irresponsible leadership" issue would be dropped in view of the guarantee offered by the National CIO.

Bridges, in a statement yesterday, cautioned against hopes for an early settlement of the nine-week strike. But waterfront sources said if negotiating committee accepts the Roth pattern negotiations could begin next week.

When the strike began Sept. 2 the longshoremen sought a wage increase of 15 cents over the basic \$1.67 an hour. The employers offered 10 cents.

The CIO Marine Engineers, one of the five unions observing the strike, already have signed a contract with the ship owners. The Federal Conciliation Service is endeavoring to bring together the Independent Engineers and the CIO Radio Operators for talks with employers.

hole in the middle of the Peninsula. Anderson said no attempt to repair the damage would be made until next week, but the county would try to string a pipe-line to the stranded Bayocoon residents, who have no fresh water source.

The community itself stands on sandstone believed strong enough to resist the storm, but there was some fear the erstwhile peninsula would become a permanent island if the battering continued.

Another nine-foot tide, further swelled by combbers from the storm, was expected today.

Damage mounted along the entire coast. In some stretches the beach was obliterated. Waves rolled far up to high ground, and occasionally dashed over seawalls.

arm signals to outright reckless driving. If apprehended, fines would have totaled \$209 in Municipal Court, according to an estimate given by Judge Ira Riddle, and \$520 in the court of Justice of Peace Thomas Hartfield, making it an expensive 15.3 seconds.

Speedway Films Shown Later in the evening, Bergere spoke to townspeople at Junior High School and showed motion pictures of auto races at the Indianapolis speedway and films on highway safety.

He told of having driven in 16 of the big Indianapolis races, starting in 1927. He is the only driver in that event to go the whole 500 miles without stopping, at an average speed of more than 100 miles per hour, and has driven the entire distance more times than anyone else.

Bergere estimates that 500 miles on the Speedway is as tough on a car as 30,000 miles on the highway. The strain on the arms and wrists of the driver as the cars are wrestled around the turns, and kept going straight as they hop and slither across the bricks of the straightaway, can probably be well imagined, Bergere said.

In 1947, Bergere had a fast car at the Indianapolis races in which he crashed several records in the first 23 laps, but it broke down and he switched to another to finish fourth. In the time trials of that particular race he rated the number two spot on the starting lineup, with Mauri Rose in the number three slot.

Bergere said many of the innovations introduced at the Indianapolis classics have since then been put into operation by automobile manufacturers. He cited rear view mirrors, balloon tires, small-horse straight 8 engines, and four-wheel brakes as some of the "firsts" introductions at the Speedway.
