

R. H. S. Indians Hold Cavemen To 19-19 Tie

Local Gridiron Warriors Upset 'Dopesters' In Battle at Grants Pass

The election was not the only upset for the week. The Roseburg High School Indians, rated as underdogs in Friday night's football game with the Grants Pass Cavemen, on the Grants Pass gridiron, turned the tables on the league leaders for a tie score, 19 to 19. The Indians were rated to lose the game by at least two touchdowns.

Power displayed by the revamped Indian lineup staggered the Cavemen. Driving hard on every play, the Redskins made their own "breaks" on recovered fumbles and punts to add to their offensive strength.

Roseburg scored twice before the Cavemen could recover from their initial shock, and came from behind in the last quarter to score a tie and thus stave off defeat.

Roseburg took possession of the ball on the 50-yard line to start the game, after two kick-offs had gone out of bounds. Displaying unexpected power, the Indians ripped wide holes in the Grants Pass line to march steadily down the field, with Dale Bonebrake scoring from the four-yard line for the initial touchdown. Mathis' kick for point missed the uprights by inches.

Scored kicked off to the Cavemen's Don Donovan, who came out to the 30, but on the next play, the Grants Pass ball carrier was hit so hard by a Roseburg tackler that he lost the ball and the Indians recovered. Roseburg drove to the 20-yard marker, but was held for downs. Grants Pass started down the field, but another fumble gave the ball to the Indians on their own 45-yard stripe, where Bill Van Horn was cleared on second down for a 50-yard spectacular run to pay dirt. Again the attempted conversion was wide of the mark.

Grants Pass put on a determined drive in the second quarter, with Don Donovan scoring late in the period. The attempt for extra points failed and the half ended with Roseburg leading 12 to 6.

Indian Defense Knifed
Grants Pass went out in front quickly as the second half got underway. Donovan returned the kickoff to the Roseburg 48-yard stripe, for a score, followed by a running play through center for the extra point, making the score Grants Pass 13, Roseburg 12.

Roseburg was kept on the defensive during the balance of the third period, and made several goal-line stands.

A Roseburg punt, opening the fourth quarter, was lost by the Grants Pass safety, after he had touched the ball. The Indians recovered on the Grants Pass 20, and put together a forward pass and four line bucks to cross the goal line, but the ball was called back because of an off-side penalty. Still in possession of the ball, the Indians used their power to advantage and on second down opened a hole through which Bonebrake raced for a touchdown. Mathis booted a perfect kick for the extra point, putting the Indians out in front 19 to 13.

Desperate and with time running out, the Cavemen threw their machine into high gear and drove 95 yards on running plays to a final touchdown as the game neared its end. The try for point failed, leaving the score 19 to 19.

New Record Set By Junior High In Sale of Magazines

Roseburg Junior High School's 12th annual magazine campaign, completed Tuesday of this week, proved by far the most successful of any, according to a report released by Principal R. R. Brand.

The total sales amounted to \$6,515.60, which was more than \$1,200 greater than that of last year. The school grossed \$2,362 as its share of the profits, but from this must be deducted the cost of prizes and awards to the participating students, and other promotional purposes. Principal Brand estimates the net profit to be about \$1,800.

A number of contests were conducted in connection with the campaign. The eighth grade class had the largest total sales, the seventh grade was second, and the ninth grade last. The eighth grade home room 103, with Mrs. Margaret Adair as adviser, had the largest home room gross, reporting sales 213 percent of its goal. One other room had a larger amount of sales, but the percentage was lower, said Mr. Brand.

High salesman was Jerry Feldkamp, eighth grader, who reported \$114.80 worth of sales. Second was Dennis Johnson, ninth grade, \$112.50; third, Tommy Keel, eighth grade, \$106.60, and fourth, Lois Patterson, ninth grade, \$104.25. Three girls, Virginia Voeller, Catherine Raade and Marsha Newland, were in the \$90 class, but the next in line fell considerably below that figure.

Total of 64 students sold \$30 or more worth of magazines, and thus earned gold seal certificates as a memento of their sales record, Brand reported.

First and second place winners will receive merchandise prizes, and all students with two or more sales will receive prizes in accordance with their work. A theater party is scheduled for all salesmen in the leading home room and the high salesman of all other rooms.

No special project was designated, but the funds are to be used to augment student body activity funds for purchase of sporting equipment, stage equipment and other things needed by the school.
