Cuyama Oil Field 'Major Discovery'

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The new Cuyama oil field is the scene of the most intensive California drilling campaign in years.

The State Division of Mines made this report today in a survey of oil and gas developments. Results of the campaign, the report said, "prove the field is an important, if not a major discovery."

The Cuyama Valley is a sedimentary basin midway between the San Joaquin Valley and the Coastal Region. The discovery well was brought in last June by the Richfield Oil Corporation just south of the Cuyama River in Northwestern Santa Barbara County. The region is known as the Russell Area.

Since June new wells have been brought in not only in the Russell Area but in the Colgrave area, Norris Areas north of the river. That area is in San Luis Obispo County.

The wells are producing from an average depth of 4,000 feet.
