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**Sen. Morse Gives
G. O. P. Advice On
How to Succeed**

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 10.—(AP) — Identifying himself as a "constitutional liberal," Sen. Wayne Morse said here Monday night that he was "sick and tired of prima donna liberals who sup-

port issues on the basis of political ethics."

The Oregon senator to a crack at party-line adherents and declared that he "doesn't vote with the Republican party on all issues."

"The people of the State of Oregon never sent me to Washington to vote for whatever the Republican Policy Committee says I should vote for," Senator Morse declared.

Commenting on the plans disclosed to spend \$3 billion on the Columbia River system, Morse said that such a program will mean a great future for the Pacific Northwest.

"We will then stand on our own stable economic legs in co-operation with associated interests in the east," the senator continued, "and we will cease being an economic colony."

With reference to the recent GOP defeat at the polls, Senator Morse said the Republicans "have got to stop talking to other Republicans and get out to see independent voters who really elect presidents anyhow."

"And you have to talk in terms of specific issues," he advised. "You are never going to elect a president on the basis of political clichés. That was the trouble with the Republicans."

Hitting hard at features of the Taft-Hartley law which he termed "unconstitutional," Morse said that out of the primary functions of our Republican form of government is to protect the politically and economically weak from the politically and economically strong.

"But that must be done within the framework of the Constitution," the senator reiterated. Labor abuses must be checked, he continued, but the Taft-Hartley law "is no, the way to do it."

The senator said that he would "insist that on the repeal of the Taft-Hartley law that there will be a substitute for it."

Political reaction, he warned, is on the way out, and collective bargaining is here to stay.

"The American people are not a people who will be taken back to the laissez-faire economy that characterized the sad period of history from the 20's to the 30's because that economy has nothing to offer except exploitation."

Blasting ship owners and labor leaders who are continuing the devastating maritime strike, Morse said that there "is no justification for the strike" from either side. Businessmen and unions should set emotionalism aside, he said.

"Until I can get them to do that," Morse warned, "there is no hope of settling the strike."

Touching on the Russian situation, Morse praised the bi-partisan foreign policy and said that Americans should be firm with the Russians but should let them know that "America stands for peace."

**Umatilla Votes
Down Road Funds**

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Umatilla County voters gave county court members their own private little headaches election day when they turned down a six-year road improvement plan.

The plan would have cost \$135,000 annually.

Money now provided for roads is little more than enough to take care of urgent maintenance, County Judge James H. Sturgis declared.

On top of that the county is wondering how the state will settle the pension issue and how much the county's funds may be tied up.

"We may be able to begin a study of the road situation in about two weeks," Judge Sturgis said, "but meanwhile there is little we can say about the future."

**Merchant Marine At
Mercy of 'Snorkel' Subs**

BOSTON, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Extensive Navy maneuvers in the North Atlantic have convinced Rear Admiral James Fife that 200 breathing submarines could sink the United States merchant fleet.

"Two hundred Guppies could sweep the United States merchant marine from the seas," Fife said. He added, however, that the United States has perfected new anti-submarine devices which should be capable of matching the Snorkels.

Units of the second fleet climaxed what the Navy described as the most extensive North Atlantic maneuvers Monday with an "invasion" of Newfoundland.

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**Housing Expediter
Woods Will Seek
Tighter Controls**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Housing Expediter Tighe Woods will ask the new Congress for tighter rent controls for "at least another year."

A spokesman for Woods gave this word to reporters yesterday. He said the housing expediter believes the new law should carry criminal penalties for violators and should plug "some of the loopholes in the present law."

The proposed one-year continuation of rent controls would be from next March 31, when the present law expires.

Among other things, it was stated, Woods will ask:

1. Control over evictions.
2. Triple damages to tenants who are over-charged.
3. Criminal penalties for rent ceiling violations, including fines or jail terms or both.

The spokesman indicated that the idea as to federal control over evictions is to give tenants some period of time during which they could not be evicted.

At present evictions are governed by the local laws in each community.

The recommendations to be urged by Woods would restore virtually all the teeth contained in rent control when it was administered by OPA in wartime.

The triple-damage provision is not contained in the present act, which went into effect last April 1. The only penalty which can be invoked by the office of the housing expediter is the restoration to the tenant of the actual amount of the overcharge.

**Building Trades
Wages Compared**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Building trades wages involved in building a home in Pacific Coast cities compare favorably with other leading cities.

This is disclosed by a survey of selected building trades in 82 cities as of Oct. 1, conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The survey covered bricklayers, carpenters, electricians, painters, plasterers, plumbers and building laborers.

The total cost of an hour's work by each of these trades was lowest on the Coast at Portland—

\$14.55. It was highest at Oakland, \$15.92. After Oakland came: San Francisco, \$15.67; Los Angeles, \$15.55; Seattle, \$15.29 and Spokane, \$15.18.

These costs compared with the following for cities scattered over the country:

Denver, \$14.41; Kansas City, \$14.25; Des Moines, \$14.40; Chicago, \$15.85; Louisville, \$14.72; New York, \$18.80; New Orleans, \$13.57; Boston, \$15.25; Newark, \$19.07; and Detroit, \$15.67.

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
