Grandfather of Tobacco Plant Being Re-Created

TUCUMAN, Argentina—(AP)—A plant which died thousands of years ago has been recreated and is growing happily in California. It is the grandfather of all tobacco plants, even though it would be a considerable disappointment if you tried to smoke it. The story of how it was created anew is a sidelight on how modern botany works.

Dr. Thomas H. Goodspeed of the Berkeley Botanical Garden is responsible for the recreation of the plant. He told about its birth during a visit to the South American Botanical Congress here. Tobacco was originally a hybrid between two entirely different plants. Under some unusual condition back before history began, they were cross fertilized and produced a new plant which continued as a new type. The new plant gradually changed and ultimately became modern tobacco. The parent plants also continued to exist and their modern descendants still grow near each

'Screening' Of Candidates For Party OK Planned

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—(AP)—A method of "screening" primary election candidates for party endorsement will be worked out by Multnomah County Democrats, Nick Granat, chairman of the County Central Committee, said today.

"We don't want to go back to the convention idea with all its evils," he said, "but we want to adopt some kind of a law which will permit us to look over all Democratic candidates in the primary and tell the voters which ones we think should be supported."

It would, he said, "eliminate the possibility of getting 'stuck' in November."

Granat said he had named State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney and Rep. Elton Howard V. Morgan to work out the plan.

Granat added that he was going to Washington Nov. 23 and would propose that all political appointees—except those in Civil Service—be replaced if they did not support President Truman in his bid for re-election.

"There are a dozen or more appointees around who had all the opportunity in the world to do something for Truman and did nothing," Granat said.

Truman Orders Probe Of Delay in Benefits to Vets

KEY WEST, Fla., Nov. 13.—(AP)—President Truman yesterday directed Defense and Veterans Administration authorities to make a full investigation into alleged delays in the payment of veterans disability and death benefits.

He asked Secretary of Defense Forrestal and Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray to report specifically on reported delay in compensation to the widow of an

Army civilian employee—a veteran—killed in a Paris plane crash last Jan. 6.

Sentences on Charles Brewer, 24, and Barbara Hillman, 22, were postponed.

Evans told the court that three of the men would follow mail carriers on their routes and then take U. S. Treasury checks from the mail boxes and later cash them.

Pinball, Punch Boards Targets of Police Threat

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 13.—(AP)—The pinball and punch board question, long a controversial one in Salem City politics and government, flared anew here Friday.

Salem Police Chief Frank Milton warned tavern and restaurant operators in newly annexed Kingwood heights that the City Police will confiscate the machines and boards immediately if they are not removed from the premises.

The Kingwood area, annexed by the city of Salem last week in the general election, lies entirely in Polk County where cash payoffs on the games have been prevalent for several years.

Such machines have not been in operation in the City of Salem since before the war.
