New Parking Restrictions
Upon recommendation of the Planning Commission, the Council adopted a motion approving parking on the south side only of East Douglas Street from Chadwick east to Claire Street, and no parking to be permitted for the short distance over the crest of the hill. Parking on one side only was also ordered for the north side on Court Street from Fowler west to Main, the elimination of parking on both sides of Court from Main to Jackson, and parking to be permitted on the north side only on Court for the two blocks west of Jackson.

The strikers say the shipowners are offering less now than they did before the walkout.

Boon to Hotels
The only ones benefitting from the strike, it seems, are the hotels on both sides of the oceans. They're jammed with stranded travelers.

In New York, for example, hundreds of persons have been left in the lurch because of today's cancelled sailing to Europe on the liner America. And in England, the Queen Elizabeth is stuck at Southampton—and so are some 2,000 passengers bound for New York. The Cunard line was going to get around the AFL dock workers strike in New York by having the Elizabeth out in at Halifax, Nova Scotia. But that plan was knocked out when Canadian longshoremen announced they would not work any ships which normally would dock at harbors in the East coast strike area.

So the whole thing remains up in the air, and now President Truman is getting appeals to step in and obtain a settlement of the wage dispute.

Local Merchant Goes Berserk

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 16.—One of Roseburg's well-known merchants, Tom Gilkey, owner of Gilkey's Dept. Store, after taking inventory Monday morning threw up his hands and started screaming and tearing up his store.

Ranting and raving, he ripped prices to shreds, and threw them to the winds. The only possibly reported cure is for people to buy the merchandise before Christmas.

Gilkey, while moaning and crying said "Thanks for reading this goofy stuff."

Two ordinances were adopted. One called for the construction of a sidewalk along the south side of East Second Avenue South from East Sixth Street to the east city limits, a distance of 492 feet. The engineer's estimate is \$3312. Bids are to be called for.

The other ordinance approved calls for a joint zoning board, in cooperation with the Douglas County Court, which will make it possible to restrict building or any type of construction in the vicinity of the Roseburg Municipal Airport.

A street light was ordered for Douglas Street at Chadwick, and the city manager was authorized to investigate the cost of restoring lights on the Deer Creek Bridge on North Jackson. The council recommended that at least one light be put into service, and if possible the two lights at either end of the bridge.

Assignment of the newly acquired areas, namely Sunda Village and Taylor's Addition brought in by voted annexation, to their proper building zones and wards was referred to the Planning Commission with the authority to hold the necessary hearings relative to zoning.

Easement Denied
Request for easement to construct a gas service line across the city park property from Lane Street to the old Salvation Army Building and to install a drainage line for roof water from the property were denied. The request was submitted by Coen Supply Company for the property owner, Marion McClarnan, and for California-Pacific Utilities. It was pointed out the building has been moved back, is being remodeled by the new owner, and plans are eventually to construct a building in front, facing on Jackson. The council's action was taken upon recommendation of

the Park Commission.

The Council approved the appointment of Mrs. Vita Wright as secretary to the city manager and city recorder and as temporary secretary of the Planning Commission. She will take the place of Mrs. Betty Clark, who has resigned, effective Nov. 20.

Zone Change Opposed
A petition bearing 19 names of property owners of Block 6, Chadwick Addition, was submitted opposing the change from residential to business zone the east side of Fowler between Court Street and Deer Creek. Since no action has been taken on the original petition asking the change, pending Planning Commission action, the new petition was also turned over to the commission for consideration.

The sidewalk along Military Street, now being widened, came up for discussion. With the street widening, the curb has been extended to within 18 inches of the sidewalk, and the walk at one place is nearly two feet higher than the street. Previously the parking strip sloped gradually, so presented no hazard. The matter of responsibility in lowering the sidewalk, if deemed necessary, was discussed. The problem was turned over to the Street Committee and City Attorney to investigate. The sidewalk, it was noted, was constructed in 1911, and the street was paved in 1922.

The council approved renewal of beer licenses to Wallace Adrian Rapp for package and retail class B at Wally's Pastime, and for Edgar Alred Vanderhoef at Van's place for retail class BB.

City Manager M. W. Slinkard and City Recorder William Bollman were authorized to attend the League of Oregon Cities meetings this Thursday, Friday and Saturday in Eugene.

The Council, after considering offers, tabled a proposal to sell

three lots on Thompson Street in the south part of town. The property has been leased to the Telephone company for storage of telephone poles, but the company has been notified of termination of the lease January 1.
