Chinese Students Good Subjects for Communism
PORTLAND, Nov. 16 — (AP) — Wilmer J. Kitchen, executive sec-

retary of the World Students Service Fund, said yesterday that Chinese colleges are so short of funds they are good subjects for Communism.

Kitchen, just back from China, said he found many college men there so hungry and discouraged that they feel "ready for almost any kind of change." Many, he said, resent U. S. aid to Chiang Kai-Shek.

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
