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Career in Radio, Newspaper Work Offered by Army

Young men interested in newspaper and radio work as a career have a special opportunity in those fields under a new Army program to provide on-the-job training with civilian newspapers, radio stations and television stations, according to S/Sgt. W. M. Stauffer, station commander of the Roseburg Army and Air Force Recruiting Service with offices in the Army.

The plan, the sergeant said, calls for enlistment of highly qualified men, veteran or non-veteran, for training in all phases of journalistic, radio and public information work.

After orientation and basic training, men accepted under the program will be assigned to leading daily newspapers and radio stations, where they will train and work as employees under the editors and station operators. During their training they will receive pay and allowances from the Army.

Sgt. Stauffer said applicants for the first class must be enlisted by November 20. He pointed out that since the program is highly selective, only a few men will be accepted from this part of the country and those interested should make application right away.

Applicants must be 18 to 25 years of age, high school graduates or able to pass a test to measure the equivalent, above average in general appearance and conversational ability, and be well recommended.

Psychiatrist Confers With Welfare Workers

Dr. H. E. Chamberlain of California, psychiatrist for family and child welfare in the state,

was present for a conference with Coos, Curry, Douglas and Lane County welfare workers and administrators Monday in Roseburg City Hall.

There were 25 in attendance, according to Lois Baker, Douglas County administrator. From Roseburg, Dr. Chamberlain went on to Medford for a conference with Klamath, Jackson and Josephine County workers.

He was accompanied and introduced here by Miss Barbara Settem, child welfare supervisor of the State Public Welfare Commission.

Miss Marguerite Thomason, field director of the Commission was in Roseburg Tuesday for conference purposes. A field worker usually visits here each month.

Vets Can Save On Paying Premiums

World War II veterans can save both money and time by paying their G. I. insurance premiums on a quarterly, semi-annual or annual basis instead of every month, Clifford Fields, Veterans Administration representative at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, pointed out today.

About 70 percent of Oregon's policyholders are paying monthly on their service insurance, Fields said. A three percent annual discount is granted, however, on three-month, six-month or 12-month payments.

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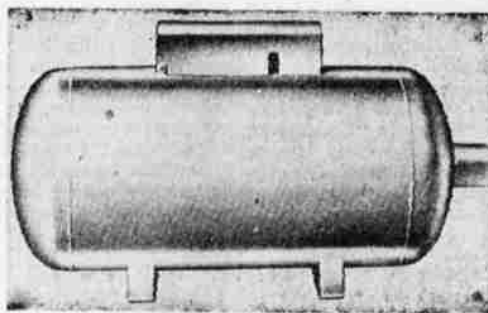
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
