

Red Element In CIO Faces Showdown

Supporters of Wallace Slated for Assault At Convention of Union

 PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 18 — (AP) — The national CIO convention next week is going to be different. All signs today pointed to the likelihood of a public showdown with the pro-Communist element in the CIO leadership.

As a starter, the dozen or so members of the executive board who supported Henry Wallace for president are expected to get a verbal bruising such as they never got at any CIO convention. They may get something more.

Various CIO leaders are talking about considering some form of action that would go beyond mere words. These plans haven't jelled into a definite proposal. But one thing being discussed is a convention resolution that would say in effect:

"Either support CIO policies in the future or resign from the executive board."

In the recent political campaign, the CIO's policy was against Wallace and all-out for President Truman.

Murray on Warpath

Here are some developments that give substance to the predictions of a real showdown:

1—CIO President Philip Murray is on the warpath. Yesterday, in a meeting of the 51-man executive board behind closed doors, he indignantly attacked Henry Wallace. He attacked the Communist party, which supported Wallace. And he is reported to have said that CIO policy-makers must choose between loyalty to the CIO and loyalty to Russian foreign policy.

2—Murray, though he didn't admit to reporters that he had made such an attack, gave out broad hints that fireworks can be expected next week. He said "CIO conventions are not wakes, you know." He said it's a "reasonable assumption" that a current drive to revoke the charter of the left-wing New York City CIO council will be debated in open session.

3—A small group of vigorous anti-Communists, including Walter Reuther, James B. Carey, and Emil Rieve, are reported to be conferring here in efforts to develop a definite plan of action against the pro-Wallace group.

4—The convention's resolutions committee begins its work today, with Van A. Bittner as chairman and Joe Curran as secretary. Both are strongly anti-Communist. Until this year the secretary of this important committee was Lee Pressman, who was the CIO's general counsel. Pressman, a Wallace supporter, is no longer around.

The executive board has recessed until Saturday. On that day, Murray said, it will take up the question of what to do about the New York City council, which has been accused of departing from CIO policies and interfering with CIO unions in the New York area.

After the board acts, its decision can be appealed to the convention itself.

New Poll System Scores Bullseye In Election Test

SEATTLE, Nov. 18 — (AP) — Directors of the Washington Public Opinion Laboratory reported today that a new system of polling scored a bullseye on the presidential election trend.

The polling was done only as a scientific check. The results weren't tabulated until after election day.

The laboratory conducted at the same time the standard type of poll and found about the same margin of error in it that appeared in the well known national polls.

Results of the polls were announced jointly by the University of Washington and Washington State College, co-sponsors of the laboratory.

The announcement said an overall error of less than one per cent was revealed in the new type of poll, known as the "Area Sample Poll." It included only registered voters.

In the area sample method, no leeway is given the interviewer in selecting persons to be polled. He is directed to a specific address and to a particular individual who has been selected previously by the central polling office. The selection is under a complicated formula which gives every adult an equal chance of being selected.

More Cost, More Accurate

The usual polling procedure, followed by the national polls, is known as the "quota sample" method. Under it, the interviewer may question any person fitting certain specified classifications, such as middle-aged, medium income, urban males, etc. In its poll by that method, the laboratory reported an error of 4.8 per cent.

"The area method," said the

announcement, "obviously is more expensive but apparently much more accurate."

Dr. J. E. Bachelder of W.S.C., and Dr. Stuart C. Dodd of the University are the co-directors of the laboratory.

The announcement said they "are not yet ready to say just what happened to the polls on election day. They do feel, however, that the success of their area sample method may supply some of the answers."

The Public Opinion Laboratory was established a year ago to conduct scientific opinion polling as a tool of the social sciences and to do research on polling techniques.

Norma Johnson, slick student chick at Senior High, said the rules state that either the man or woman may request the date,

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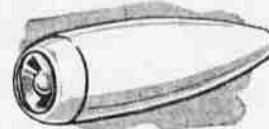
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
