

Joe Louis Finds Bivins Toughest Thus Far on Tour

CLEVELAND, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis labels Jimmy Bivins the toughest opponent he has faced so far on his exhibition tour.

"I don't know why he shouldn't be a contender if he gets serious about his training," Louis said last night after engaging in a six-round no-decision affair with the Cleveland Negro.

"He threw two good right hand punches and I knew I was hit, but they weren't hard enough to bother me," the champion added. "Anyone who fights him has to be very careful."

With both fighters using 2-ounce gloves instead of the regulation eight, Bivins opened a cut above Louis' left eye in the second round. Joe received the wound originally Nov. 8 when he accidentally bumped heads with Johnny Siskor in an exhibition at Boston.

The cut bled only slightly, but Bivins opened it up again in the fourth.

Bivins did most of the leading, while Louis opened up only sporadically. He almost dropped Bivins with a right in the second when the two were in a neutral corner.

The champion jabbed most of the time and seemed content to take it easy, but opened up suddenly at one point in the fifth and drove Bivins to cover with a flurry of rights and lefts.

Although the exhibition was a no-decision affair, matchmaker Larry Atkins conducted a poll among newsmen at ringside and reported the writers favored Bivins by a 9 to 5 vote. However, most everyone agreed that Louis had plenty in reserve.

Louis weighed 220 and had a 40-pound edge over Bivins, who appeared to be in extra good shape.

Support Prices at Issue
The question of farm support prices versus cash subsidies is expected to be one of the knottiest problems.

It also is known to look favorably on national Master Albert S. Goss's view that federal aid to education must not result in "political control whereby the minds of our children could be moulded to suit the whim of the party in power."

The Grange also prepared to object to federal control over use of land and state militias.

California Gets '49 Meet
Grange decided today to hold its 1949 convention in California.

The convention city and the date will be selected later by the organization's committee and national master.

The convention elected Roy Hawes, of North Sudbury, master of the Massachusetts state grange, to the grange's four-member executive committee. He succeeds Lee Pritchard, master of the Colorado state grange. The other three members hold over.

Truman Names Dulles, Cohen For Service at U. N.

KEY WEST, Fla., Nov. 18.—(AP)—President Truman today designated John Foster Dulles as acting chairman of the United States delegation to the United Nations in his first official post-election endorsement of this country's bipartisan foreign policy.

The president at the same time appointed Benjamin V. Cohen as chief United States delegate to the UN general assembly in Paris to replace Republican Warren Austin, who has returned to the United States because of illness.

Dulles served as foreign policy advisor to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, GOP presidential nominee, whom Mr. Truman defeated in the November election.

Secretary Marshall is returning to the United States for a full review of the peace outlook with President Truman at the White House Monday.

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Future Program On Wages, Hours Adopted by IWA

To strengthen the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) in Southern Oregon, a five-point program for future negotiations with employers was adopted at a recent meeting here of the executive board of District Council No. 7.

It is recommended that local unions adopt the program and present the five points for consideration to the IWA-CIO in January, when plans for next year's negotiations will be drawn.

The points follow:
1. A general wage increase of 30 cents per hour.
2. A health and welfare plan similar to the demands made in the 1948 negotiations.
3. A six-hour day with no reduction in wages.
4. Paid holidays — straight time pay if not worked, 2½ times regular rate if worked.
5. State and national election days to be included as holidays.
