

**Two Flying Services At North Bend Suspended**

NORTH BEND, Ore., Nov. 19. (P)—Two flying services at North Bend Airport have been suspended by the City Council.

The closure order affecting Bay Flying Service and Pacific Airways, will be continued until the council concludes that friction between the two has been smoothed and "other matters" have been settled, officials said.

The order suspends instruction, charter flights and plane rentals from the field.

Part of the friction was aired before the council last week in arguments on cause of Nov. 7 plane crash fatal to two Coquille men.

**October Rainfall Far Under Monthly Normal**

October was an exceptionally dry month, with only .97 inches of rainfall, compared with a normal rainfall of 2.61, a report from the local Weather Bureau reveals. There were only seven days of rain, although a trace of rain was recorded on 14 days.

The summary shows three clear days, seven partly cloudy and 21 cloudy.

The highest temperature was recorded Oct. 17, when the mercury climbed to 78, and the lowest was recorded Oct. 27 at 31 degrees. The mean temperature of 65.1 was slightly above the normal of 64.6.

The highest wind velocity reached was 18 miles per hour on Oct. 7 and 11, but for the most part the velocity remained at a low figure.

**Nobel Peace Prize Not To Be Awarded This Year**

OSLO, Norway, Nov. 19.—(P)—The Norwegian Nobel Prize Committee announced today that no Nobel peace prize will be awarded this year.

Two-thirds of the amount awarded for the prize from the will of Alfred B. Nobel, Swedish explosive magnate, will go into the Nobel Institute's "special fund," the committee said. The prize last year amounted to nearly \$41,000.

The peace award last year went to the United States and British organizations of the Society of Friends (Quakers).
