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PIE CRUST

MINCE PIES ARE IN SEASON!

Use this recipe for easy, flaky pie crust to do justice to your spicy mince for the holidays.

- 2 cups Fisher's Blend Flour
- 1 teaspoon Salt
- 3/4 cup Shortening
- 1/4 cup Cold Water

Have ingredients very cold. Sift and measure flour. Resift with salt. Cut in half shortening until consistency of coarse corn meal. Add remainder of shortening and cut in until particles are the size of peas. Mix in the water. Cover and let stand for a few minutes. Roll as desired. Fit into pie tin. Fill with mince-meat. Cover with top crust and perforate. Bake at 425° for 30 to 40 minutes. Yield: One 9-inch pie.

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
