The Yuan acted under a constitutional requirement that it must uphold the president's nomination. President Chiang Kai-Shek had nominated Sun to replace Wong Wen-Hao, who resigned.

Murray's Rap at Reds Draws Wild Acclaim

A political campaign against Albert J. Fitzgerald, president of the Electrical Workers, has petered out. Some vigorous right-wingers wanted to defeat Fitzgerald as a CIO vice-president. Murray wouldn't give his blessing to the movement. So Fitzgerald was expected to be re-elected without opposition today, along with the other eight CIO vice-presidents.

Fitzgerald Outspoken

Convention delegates are still discussing with excited argument the speech Fitzgerald made Wednesday.

He said he didn't "give a damn" for Russia and thinks Vishinsky and Molotov have engaged in "saber-rattling and war-mongering."

He said he isn't "married" to the Progressive Party (he was one of Henry Wallace's leading supporters) and will tell that party to "go to hell" if President Truman makes a "sincere effort" to carry out his platform pledges.

Beneath the surface of the tide of enthusiasm for Murray's leadership ran two small currents of anxiety today:

1—Some in the CIO who hate Communism were saying—in private—that Murray couldn't crack down as hard as he could have on the pro-Communist influences in the leadership of the Electrical Workers.

2—On the other hand, some moderates who also oppose Communism worried—also in private—lest the pendulum might have swung a bit too far in the direction of repressing all opposition to the leadership's measures.

But those were only topics for conversation in hotel rooms and restaurants. They did not seriously mar the general happiness.

The delegates of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers, Textile workers, Auto Workers, the National Maritime Union, Murray's own Steelworkers, and all the other right-wing unions of the CIO were slapping one another on the backs and chuckling over the way "Uncle Phil" handled things.

The announcement of the Pacific terms described the proposed new pact as "one based on complete good faith." The two sides joined in the prediction that "this contract and this new spirit can mean a new era for West Coast shipping."

Some 28,000 strikers and others idled by the walkout have been idled the job from Canada to Mexico in this maritime strike, exceeded in length only by the bloody 1936 strike that lasted 98 days.

The Pacific American Steamship Association still must settle with the CIO Marine Cooks and Stewards, the Independent Marine Firemen and the CIO Radio Operators. An agreement was reached some time ago with the Marine Engineers, but it was contingent upon settlement with the other unions.

Ban on Bridges Off

The employers' resolve to do no more business with presidents Harry Bridges of the longshoremen and Hugh Bryson of the cooks and stewards unless they signed non-Communist affidavits was dropped as direct negotiations were resumed two weeks ago under a fresh burst of harmony.

The East Coast strike affected the sailing and docking of several luxury ships, and tied up about 250 vessels. Besides the pay boost, peace terms include a broad welfare plan, extra vacation benefits and a retrenchment of the twice-a-day work call with a guarantee of four hours of work for men called out in any one day.

Liquor Ban on Indians 'Worthless,' Medics Say

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covered by the Harrison Narcotic Act, but that its use is prohibited by law in some of the Southwestern states.

"It is high time that the sale and possession of this drug be restricted by a national law," Guardianship Scored

Another report on Indian affairs came from Senator Ferguson (R-MICH.), who told newsmen in Tucson, Ariz., that the government's 80-year guardianship over Indians produced "pretty dreary results" and should be

ended at the earliest possible moment.

"Conditions among the Navajos make a mockery of President Truman's civil rights talk," Ferguson said after a five-day visit to the Navajo and Hopi reservations in Northern Arizona.

He said Congress appropriated \$2,000,000 last summer for Indian welfare and intended that the money be used for food and other necessary items. Instead, Ferguson said, he found that only an "infinitesimal amount" went for food or welfare. Mostly it was spent, he said, for such things as building roads.

Medical Care Inadequate

The American Medical Association Committee found Indian medical care inadequate due to a shortage of physicians and nurses, caused in turn by poor pay, overwork, inadequate facilities and "an atmosphere of lack of permanence and of uncertainty."

"While in many instances professional standards of medical officers in the Indian service are not of the highest type, never-

less we gained the impression that they were doing a pretty good job," the report said.

"We were impressed with their

loyalty to the Indian service, their interest in professional problems and their human interest in their patients."

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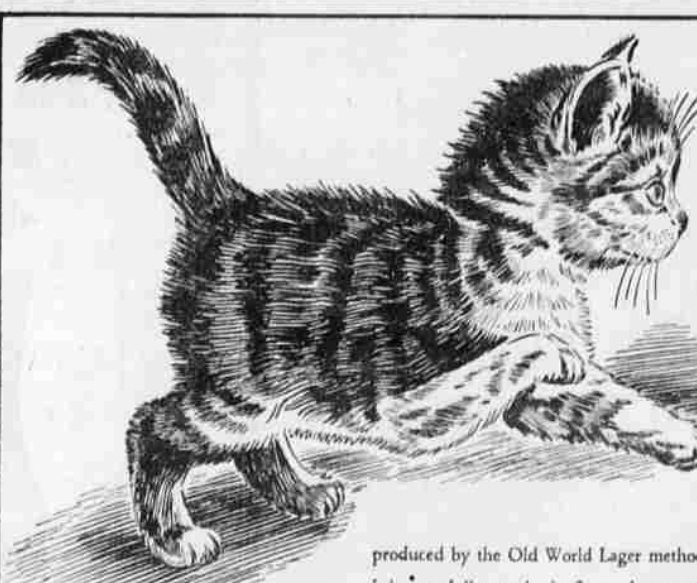


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
