

Grants Pass Beats Medford to Gain Jefferson Playoff

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The Grants Pass Cavemen won a state football title berth last night, downing Medford, 13-6, in a spectacular game marked by a 100-yard run and three touchdowns within the first three and a half minutes.

The victory sends Grants Pass against Jefferson of Portland, Dec. 4 for the state prep grid-iron title.

Grants Pass, Medford, and again Grants Pass scored in rapid succession after the opening kickoff last night. And that was the game. Medford, an almost perennial victor over Grants Pass and holder of an early season 7-6 defeat of the Cavemen, threatened only once more. In the third quarter Medford reached the Cavemen's 10-yard line, but was held there.

It was Medford that furnished the most dramatic play, however. Fullback Jack Morgan took a Grants Pass kickoff on his own goal line, and scampered the full length of the field to paydirt. Grants Pass opened the scoring in the first minute and a half. Center Dick Warren blocked a kick, and the ball went out of bounds on Medford's 17. Three line plunges—the last by Quarterback Clinton Rees—brought a touchdown.

It was on the ensuing kickoff that Medford's Morgan made his 100-yard run. Almost immediately afterward, Grants Pass recovered a fumble on Medford's six yard line. It took just one play—Vernon Craft's line plunge—to make the Cavemen's second score.

Reserved Seat Tickets

To Go on Sale Monday

After Monday, season tickets will be sold during the regular Chamber business hours, until Friday noon, and then will be available until game time Friday, Dec. 3, at the High School.

Season ticket purchasers may take their pick of seats in the first four rows on the east side of the gymnasium. All tickets will be sold on a "first come, first served" basis, with the exception of varsity ball players' parents, who may have first choice of reserved seats. Season ticket books will be sold at \$10 each, which will admit the holder to all home contests played by the varsity. No reserved seats will be "behind a post," Newby emphasized.

DECLINE BOWL BID

OLEAN, N. Y., Nov. 27.—(AP)—St. Bonaventure, beaten only once and tied only in nine football games, will play in none of the bowls. Rejection of a bid from the Clear Bowl at Tampa, Fla., was announced last night by the Rev. Silas Rooney, O. F. M., athletics director. He explained college authorities felt any bowl game would mean "too much lost time" for the players.

Coach Jim Aiken Scouts SMU, Bid For Bowl Likely

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Head Coach Jim Aiken of Oregon headed here by air to scout Southern Methodist in its football game today against Texas Christian in case, he said, his team should play SMU in the Cotton Bowl New Year's Day.

At Eugene, University of Oregon officials declined to say whether "we had received a bid to the game."

A conference rule prohibits a member from playing in a bowl game New Year's Day except in Honolulu and Pasadena, Calif. Aiken flew yesterday to Los Angeles, headquarters of Conference Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt. Schmidt refused to comment on whether Oregon had requested permission to play at Dallas.

Early today Aiken boarded an American Airlines plane for Dallas. While the Webfoots' coach declined to say whether he had a conference vote on permission to play SMU, he laughingly said Oregon was interested in bowl games and admitted he was not coming here just to see the sights of the city.

Oregon and California both were unbeaten in Coast Conference play. But a vote of the ten member schools gave the undefeated Bears the Rose Bowl bid, even though Oregon had seven conference victories and California only six. The Webfoots' only 1-4 of the season, a 14-0 setback by Michigan, was believed to have figured in giving California the Rose Bowl nod. Aiken said in Los Angeles he has not scouted Southern Methodist this season. He chuckled at the prospect of a battle between Mustang Doug Walker and his top passer, Norman Van Brocklin. Aiken said he considers Van Brocklin one of the best grid players he has ever seen.

NBA Suspends Graziano For Apostoli Runout

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Rocky Graziano, former middleweight champion, has been suspended indefinitely from boxing in all parts of the world under NBA supervision. The ruling on the Brooklyn, N. J., boxer was announced yesterday by Abe J. Greene, president of the NBA and followed similar action by the California State Boxing Commission. The California Commission acted, Joe Genshlea, its secretary, said, as a result of Graziano's "running out" on a fight Dec. 1, in Oakland, Calif., with Fred Apostoli.

Coast Teams End Season Against Intersectional Foe

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Notre Dame, aiming for a new school winning record of 21 consecutive football victories, tangled with the University of Washington today before a capacity crowd of 56,000.

The Irish, closing out their 1948 home stand before their 24th straight sellout crowd, enter the game with a winning streak of 20 and an undefeated sequence of 26 which includes the scoreless tie with Army in 1946.

Both marks, which equal Notre Dame records will fall today if the Irish make the Huskies their ninth victims of the 1948 campaign. Notre Dame ends its season against Southern California in Los Angeles, Dec. 4.

Washington, hampered by the season-long illness of Head Coach Howie Odell, has won only from U. C. L. A. and Idaho this campaign while losing to Minnesota, Washington, State, California, Stanford, Oregon and Southern California. The Huskies held Oregon State to a 14-14 standstill.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Oregon State College and the University of Nebraska collide in Multnomah Stadium at 2 p. m. today in the final game of this state's football season. The favored Oregon State Beavers got a helpful nod from the weatherman. Showers, he said, are probable.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Bruised from a 40-0 lacing last week by Michigan State, the Cougars of Washington State College, faced the Nittany Lions of Penn State today in the season's final football game for both teams.

The experts expected W. S. C. to do a bit better against the Lions, but only because the field
