Italian Commies
Rearing Children
In Their Doctrines

ROME—"Children of the world unite," is the latest war cry of the Communist Party in Italy.

In its weekly publication, "Vie Nuove,"—New Roads—a page for tiny tots gives Mother Goose rhymes and tales a Red twist. Cartoons and comic strips are used to guide the first steps of children on the Communist path.

Its director is Luigi Longo, better known in the past for his leadership of the Italian Communist underground than as a child's guide to Communism.

The current issue knocks a few old proverbs in the head and repeats, with pictures, the story of Little Red Riding Hood—featuring "Little Italy" as the wayward wail and America as a top-hatted starred and striped big, bad wolf.

"There is a place for everybody in the world. (But what place?)" it asks. "There are those for first place and those for last, in the theaters and trains as in life. There are those who have a building all to themselves and there are families of eight, 10 people who live in a single room. There could be, yes, a place for all in this world. But, for that social justice is needed which only Communism can assure. In the U.S.S.R., for example, there is a place for all."

The current issue's special attraction is the story of Red Riding Hood, in verse, with a final twist, thus:

"The fable recalls a great, greedy beast—
"An American wolf—who constantly feasts;
"And now with sly smile and
