### Farmer Jones Is Winner Over Parks In Wild Battle

Saturday night's wrestling show at the Roseburg Armory nearly developed into an audience participation affair when Herb Parks' killer instinct got the better of him and he attempted to terminate Farmer Jones' future wrestling activity with a murderous Boston Crab in the main event.

Both referee Buck Davidson, a competent wrestler in his own right, and matchmaker Elton Owen got into the fray in an effort to nip a near-riot in the bud. Parks actually won the fall, but he maintained the hold too long, and the verdict was awarded to Jones.

The preliminary turned out to be more than the advance notices promised, when Frank Murdock, who lost to Maurice LaChappelle in the one hour, two-out-of-three fall tilt, offered to prove to the audience his "Sleeper Hold," with which he took the second fall, was a lot more convincing than it looked from outside the ropes.

It seems members of the audience disputed whether a knock-out could be administered by merely fingering a set of nerves alongside an opponent's neck.

Arthur Fagerness, Myrtle Creek volunteer to let Murdock demonstrate, Murdock wrapped his arm around Fagerness' neck, and the latter crumpled up—but quick.

Later, Fagerness was asked, "What was it like?"

He was quick to defend Murdock as a master of putting his

opponents into dreamland by the "Sleeper Hold" method.

Main Event Tough

The first fall of the main event went to Farmer Jones after some fast action, in which Parks attempted to brain Jones by driving him into the corner posts, among other things. Parks then tried to dispatch Jones with shoulder butts, but the farmer quickly got down on all fours and mule-kicked Parks into submission.

The tempo quickened in the second fall which, incidentally, proved to be the last. Farmer used his feet to good advantage, and Parks enlisted aid of the ropes. Parks took the fall, but lost it and the match when he failed to heed Davidson's order to desist.

Embittered, Parks laid into the referee, and Davidson had to utilize his knowledge of the wrestling art to ward off the attack. Davidson came off the ropes, rammed Parks, and both put on a short but furious battle.

The crowd began moving toward the arena, and Elton Owen decided things were beginning to get out of hand. He climbed through the ropes and was met with a couple of punches administered by Parks.

After a brief skirmish, with Jones, Parks, Davidson and Owen all engaged in a free-for-all, not to mention a couple of snipes taken at Parks by aroused fans, things calmed down.

Owen said later he would recommend to the wrestling commission that Parks be fined \$25. Asked if a grudge match could be arranged between Parks and Davidson, Owen admitted it wouldn't be a bad idea.

The preliminary proved to be a demonstration of scientific wrestling combined with judo, administered by Murdock. Both he and LaChappelle put on the kind of mat performance popular with local fans. The Frenchman took the first fall after 23 minutes with a combination surfboard and step-over toe-hold.

The second fall went to Murdock, who applied the harmless looking, but devastating "Sleeper Hold." LaChappelle came back in the third fall with a drop-kick and body press.

### Basketball Game Date is Advanced

The Grants Pass-Roseburg basketball game, originally scheduled for Friday night, has been advanced to Wednesday, Dec. 1 at 8 p. m. The new date was set so Grants Pass students may attend both the basketball game to be played in the Roseburg gymnasium and the Grants Pass-Jefferson High state championship football game to be played in Portland Saturday.

Coach Jack Newby said this means the Senior High loop squad will have to work extra hard between now and Wednesday to make up for the lost practice hours resulting from the advanced opening date.

Asked how Grants Pass stacks up as a team this year, Newby said he knows little about their present abilities. However, he warned that Grants Pass always puts up a good fight and is one of the outstanding teams in their district.

Last year's game here with Grants Pass proved to be a last ditch stand, with the Cavemen ending on top of a 45-43 score. The Indians put on a terrific last quarter rally, closing the gap in the score, against an outstanding Southern Oregon quintet, but the final gun went off "a little too soon," Newby said.

Graves reports that many persons have expressed an interest in learning trapshooting but hesitate to mix with experienced shooters at practice shoots. The club, Graves said, will hold classes for beginners at frequent intervals if sufficient interest is shown.

Trapshoots are to be held each Sunday, starting at 10 a. m., throughout the winter season. Plans also are being made for registered shoots in the spring season.
