

Indians Ready For Grants Pass Quint In Season Opener

Tonight at 8 o'clock, basketball comes to Roseburg with the Grants Pass Indians and the Grants Pass Cavemen initiating their 1948-49 season play on the Senior High basketball court.

Coach Jack Newby's varsity squad held their final pregame practice yesterday at the gymnasium and the squad went through a rugged scrimmage, showing much speed and adroitness in manipulating the ball from player to player and into the basket.

Fast breaks and close-in shots were executed with precision although weak spots were noted in a few instances, when the ball was thrown out of reach of the intended recipient.

Newby said he expects the Cavemen to put up a tough battle in spite of the fact several talented Grants Pass hoopers are still in football gear at Portland readying to play Jefferson High School of that city for the state championship Saturday night.

While the Indians starters will not definitely be known until game time, Newby reports the probable starting lineup will consist of Daryl Blank in the center spot, Don Hubbard and Clint Agee forwards, and Bob Schindler and Frank Olsen guards. This combination will average 73 inches in height, according to Newby.

Hubbard and Blank are each two-year lettermen, while Schindler, a clever ball-handler who excels in long-shots, has earned one letter playing for Roseburg. The three will form the backbone of this year's squad along with one-year letterman, Bob Rogers, who broke into varsity play mid-season last year.

Hubbard, 17-year-old senior, playing his last season here, was awarded the "Inspiration" trophy last year, while Blank was voted outstanding defense and backboard man in the conference the same year.

Agee, 6-1, 18-year-old senior, and transfer from Glendale, should add considerable strength to backboard play while Frank Olsen, 16-year-old sophomore, who played first string at Junior High last year, is a promising young player who may develop into a top-notch before too long.

Half-time entertainment tonight will be handled by the Senior class which will put on a publicity stunt advertising the Carnival scheduled for Thursday night at the Roseburg Armory.

Human Death Toll In Deer Season Thus Far is 110

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—(AP)—At least 110 persons in 21 states have been killed so far this season by gunfire while hunting deer.

Other fatalities in connection with the deer hunting trips—drownings, auto accidents and heart ailments—boosted the death toll to more than 200.

The gunfire toll probably will surpass last year's, when 141 hunters were fatally shot. In some states this year's hunting season has not ended or has not begun.

A survey by the Associated Press showed Maine leading the list of reported gunfire casualties with 17.

New York counted 16, Colorado 11, Michigan 10, Wisconsin 10, Idaho 9 and Oregon 7. The New York, Colorado and Idaho totals are record highs. Washington had three hunters slain.

In Texas, where an average of 28 deer hunters are killed each year, only three have been fatally shot this season. But the season began only last Friday and doesn't end until Dec. 31.

The Texas toll in the past has been among the highest. In Pennsylvania, where the number of licensed hunters fell from 850,000 last year to 550,000 this year, the worst year was in 1931, when 72 game hunters died. The season opened Monday. It will close Dec. 11.

Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, Washington, Oregon and Wisconsin have reported record high totals of from 10 to 21 hunter deaths in recent years.

The death toll is more than doubled by causes incident to hunting.

For instance, in Washington this year the 13 dead from various causes included three shot when mistaken for deer; three drowned; four dead of heart failure, two asphyxiated in automobiles, and one who was acci-

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Enrique Bolanos, lightweight prizefighter of Mexico, finds himself practically out of opponents today except for his No. one quarry, champion Ike Williams.

The contender took care of an outstanding foe, Tommy Campbell, Rock Island, Ill., Negro, in vicious style last night, winning a unanimous 12-round decision and retaining his California lightweight title. Each weighed 134½ pounds.

Bolanos' manager, George Parnass, said his fighter's one ambition is for a third match with Williams. Williams stopped Bolanos two years ago and won a split decision in 15 rounds last May.

Warning Voiced on More Taxation on Business
