

Vets Hospitals In Urgent Need Of More Doctors

Veterans Administration hospitals in the Pacific Northwest urgently need at least ten more doctors, including specialists and general practitioners, Dr. John L. Haskins, manager of the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, reported today.

Three specialists in chest diseases, two radiologists, one bacteriologist and several general physicians and psychiatrists are among the immediate needs, Dr. Haskins said.

Salaries range from \$4,479 to \$10,305 a year, depending on medical qualifications. Physicians certified by an American board gain an added 25 per cent, up to a maximum of \$11,000.

VA hospitals are located at Portland and Roseburg, in Oregon; American Lake, Walla Walla and Vancouver, Wash.; Boise, Idaho, and Fort Harrison, Mont. New hospitals are being built now at Seattle and Spokane, Wash., and Miles City, Mont., and another will rise at Klamath Falls.

Doctors interested in positions with the VA department of medicine and surgery may contact a veterans' hospital manager or the medical director, VA branch 11, Exchange Building, Seattle.

Medics Prepared To Battle Federal Health Program

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 3—(AP)—The American Medical Association yesterday announced that it is collecting \$3,500,000 from American doctors as a fund to oppose any government controlled health program.

This action was taken at a secret session from which the press was excluded. The A.M.A. assessed \$25 against each of its 140,000 members.

The statement named the recent report by Federal Security Administrator Oscar Ewing as an

example of objectionable compulsory insurance.

"The fund is," the report said, "for a nationwide plan of education on the progress of American medicine, the importance of the conservation of health and the advantage of the American system in securing a wide distribution of a high quality of medical care."

"The American Medical Association re-affirms its belief and the application of the principle of medical care insurance on a voluntary basis."
