On Your Dial**Nation Wasting
Atomic Power,
Scientist Says**

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(AP)—The nation is wasting its atomic power, some leading industrial scientists say.

A new large-scale power industry based on atomic energy could be established right now with the engineering knowledge already on hand, they contend. And it could be done on a basis competitive with other power costs.

So much heat is being wasted right now from the piles producing materials for A-bombs that it actually raises the temperature of the Columbia River several degrees, one scientist declared.

He is Dr. John J. Grebe, chemist of the Dow Chemical Co., and along with other scientists he discussed the nation's lag in putting its atomic knowledge to industrial use, at the annual meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers here.

The Columbia River incident arises because piles producing plutonium at the Hanford Works of the Atomic Energy Commission have to be cooled with large quantities of water, and the heat is lost forever when the water flows back into the Columbia. This atomic heat, Dr. Grebe says, could be used to supplant present heat sources, which the chemical industry gets from electric plants. This heat is used in making chemical combinations of carbon, hydrogen, oxygen and nitrogen. Atomic heat could be used in making many chemical products used in the food and clothing industry.

Dr. Grebe adds that imaginative engineering can use this atomic heat and other pile by-products in small plants without leaning on government subsidies.

**Sanitary Facilities In
National Parks Scored**

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Gus Backman, president of the Western States Council, yesterday gave the California State Chamber of Commerce a dismal picture of the sanitary and recreation facilities in national parks and forests in the West.

Backman said the situation constitutes an emergency. "Either many parts of the national forests and national parks should be closed," Backman said, "or the necessity for a minimum of sanitation, water service, new recreational facilities and the rehabilitation of existing facilities be recognized by Congress and the necessary funds provided."

He said rough figures indicated appropriations for the U. S. Forest Service should be increased as follows: Operational division, from \$578,000 to about \$1,600,000. Maintenance, from \$400,000 to \$1,000,000. Construction, from \$79,000 last year to approximately \$5,000,000 a year for five years.

**Western Truck Drivers
Nation's Best, Assn. Told**

PORTLAND, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The Western states use more trucks than the rest of the country and drive them better, the Oregon Motor Transport Association was told here.

Walter Belsen, public relations director of the American Trucking Association, said the 11 Western states lead the field in application of load limits and use of truck transportation. "Even with the large amount of trucking in this state," added Belsen, "the local association has done an excellent job in promoting safety. Some of the drivers here have safety records of more than 2,000,000 miles."

**Two Arrested With Big
Fortune in Narcotics**

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(AP)—A huge quantity of narcotics which police said apparently was destined for sale in the Broadway theatrical and night club district, was seized Saturday.

Two men, Jack Gordon, 40, and Edward Eichler, 48, both New York salesmen, were arrested in Gordon's midtown furnished room, where the narcotics allegedly were found by detective and federal agents. Gordon and Eichler were charged with illegal possession of narcotics. Police estimated the "street sale" value of the narcotics which included six and a fourth pounds of pure heroin and 5,800 morphine tablets, at more than three-quarters of a million dollars.

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Three Greek Orthodox priests are to be tried here this week on charges of leading a fight to carve a great Ukrainian Republic out of parts of Soviet Russia and her Communist neighbors.

Press and radio attacks upon both the Greek and Roman Catholic Churches preluded the announcement of details. The priests are formally accused of anti-state activities.

The three priests—Pavel Hlucok, Rehor Buranic and Sebastian Sabol—are charged with being the actual leaders of anti-Communist Ukrainians fighting to establish a republic extending from the Kuban River in Russia to the Poprad River in Eastern Czechoslovakia.

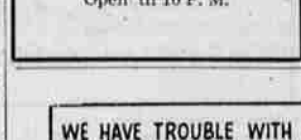
Such a state would cut more than 800 miles across sections of Slovakia, Poland, Romania, the Soviet Ukraine and Cossack coun-
