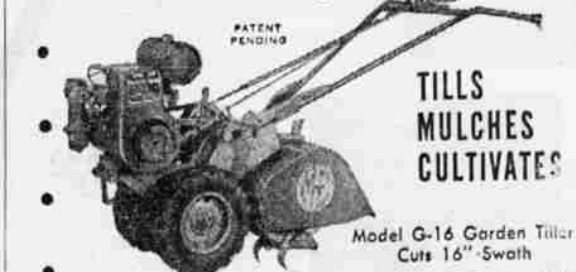
Fulks, in the warrant sworn against Morris (Moxie) Fleishman, said he was offered money to "throw" games in the Basketball Association of America.

Idaho's Vandals missed a high percentage of their shots and loomed as no conference threat in downing the Whitman Missionaries, 43-30, at Walla Walla.

Washington State and Oregon were idle.

Coach Slat Gill had cause to smile as one of his Oregon State regulars, Dan Torrey, found the

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hoop for 21 points on 10 field goals and a gift shot.

Gill watched Torrey two years ago as a freshman and tabbed him as a future star. The fleet guard failed to live up to expectations last season but hit a torrid scoring pace last night. Cliff Cranfall, the Beavers' usual sparkplug, was second high for his club with 11 points and held Willamette's dangerous Bob Johnson to a single basket. Brother Jim Johnson led the Beavers with 18.
