Official Vote on Issue Of Annexation Reported

The official returns of the election held Friday to determine the West Roseburg annexation issue shows the city vote to be 119 yes and 14 no, according to the city recorder's office.

Ward 1 (County Court House) 29 yes, 5 no. Ward 2 (Junior High School) 26 yes, 3 no. Ward 3 (Roseburg Hotel) 27 yes, 4 no. Ward 4 (City Hall) 37 yes, 2 no. The annexation issue was defeated by West Roseburg residents, who cast 142 yes and 188 no votes, a negative majority of 46.

Dr. Daniel Poling, Leader in Oregon Church Work, Dies

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 13.—Funeral services will be held tomorrow for Dr. Daniel V. Poling, 83, prominent clergyman and for many years a leader in Oregon church, education and youth activities.

He died here Saturday after a long illness.

The service will be at the First Presbyterian Church in Albany where he served as pastor for ten years.

Dr. Poling, a member of a famous ministerial family, was a teacher in Pennsylvania and Oregon before becoming pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Portland in 1890. He served later in congregational churches in LaFayette, Independence, Albany, The Dalles and again in Portland.

After retirement from the pulpit, he became high school visitor for the Oregon System of Higher Education until 1947. He had been active in youth work and interested in sports. He was a former member of the Oregon Racing Commission and president of the Albany Boxing Commission as well as presiding judge for a few years at the Oregon State Fair. A hall in the permanent men's dormitory at Oregon State College is named in his honor.

He is survived by the widow, Martha Alice Williams Poling, and three of five children. They are Harold Wayne Poling, Albany; Helen V. and Dan W., both of Corvallis. Dan W. Poling is dean of men at Oregon State College. There are five grandchildren.

Conducting the service at Albany at 1:30 p. m. will be the Rev. Morton Booth, resident pastor, assisted by the Rev. Robert D. Bulkeley, pastor of the Corval-

lis Federated Church, and the Rev. Paul A. Davies, Portland, superintendent of the Oregon Congregational Conference.


