

### Parks Victor Over Davidson; LaBelle Flattens Kneilson

It was sweet revenge for Herb Parks, rugged Canadian grappler, when he bested Buck Davidson of Klamath Falls in a two-out-of-three falls, one-hour main event at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night. The preliminary was taken by Rene LaBelle with a straight fall series. His opponent was Stocky Kneilson.

Parks vowed to get even with Davidson, when the latter, acting as referee in a recent bout between Parks and Farmer Jones, awarded the match to Jones due to Parks' fouling after the bell.

Parks got to work on the K-Fall grappler quickly in the first fall, and with the aid of ring-side ropes, pinned Davidson after applying a wicked knee-stomp.

The second fall was a rough-and-tumble affair, and both men utilized their elbows with good results. Parks, a master of taking to the ropes when the going gets bad, was pulled away by Davidson, and pinned with a surt-board.

The advantage shifted alternately from one to the other in the third fall, with the crowd egging Davidson on in his victory try. After a considerable amount of bone-bending by both parties, Davidson bounced off the ropes and sent Parks reeling with a shoulder butt. Davidson attempted to repeat the maneuver, but Parks met him with a knee in the solar plexus. This staggered Davidson and made him easy meat for a bodypress.

**Kneilson Has Bad Fight**

In the preliminary, a heated contest developed during the first fall, with both LaBelle and Kneilson fighting to gain the upper hand. Kneilson finally got the French-Canadian in a horizontal position on the mat, and commenced to rub his wiry beard in LaBelle's eyes.

Referee Elton Owen caught the maneuver, and immediately awarded the fall to LaBelle on the technicality. Kneilson was bitter and attempted to elude Owen, but Owen lifted his dukes, connected with a couple of solid punches, and Kneilson dropped to the mat and covered his face.

The second and final fall saw both LaBelle and Kneilson use repeated flying mares to soften his opponent. The Frenchy was thrown into the ropes twice, but he came off and butted Kneilson, who staggered from the force of the blow. LaBelle bounced off the ropes again, drop-kicked, and pinned the Swede with a bodypress.

### Ted Williams Tops American League Hitters 4th Time

CHICAGO, Dec. 13 (AP)—During a season in which overall hitting generally improved, Ted Williams slammed through to the 1948 American League batting championship, his second crown in a row and his fourth in five actual playing campaigns.

The Boston Red Sox outfielder, who was in the navy from 1943-1945, today was certified with a 329 percentage for the 1948 schedule, 26 points better than his winning clip in 1947. He finished 14 points ahead of his nearest rival, Lou Boudreau, Cleveland manager-shortstop, who settled for a final .355 after pressing the 30-year-old Boston outfielder most of the season.

Williams officially becomes the third player in the league's 48-year old history to win the hitting title four or more times.

The peerless Ty Cobb tops the list with an amazing 12 championships. Tim Lincecum follows with four to the Harry Heilmann, who, like Cobb, slugged for the Detroit Tigers.

### Disabled Veterans Over 55 Qualify For VA Pensions

Veterans over 55 years of age who have non-service connected disabilities may now qualify for Veterans Administration pensions under recent regulation changes, the VA reports.

VA regulations now specify that a veteran, age 55, with a non-service connected disability rating of 60 percent for one or more disabilities permanent in nature, and who is unemployable, may be considered permanently and totally disabled for VA pension purposes. Previously, a disability rating of 60 percent for one permanent disability, or a combined rating of 70 percent with one or more ratable at 40 percent, was required.

At age 60, veterans may qualify for VA pensions if they have non-service connected disabilities rated 50 percent in degree and are unable to follow a substantially gainful occupation because of the disability. At age 65, the disability requirement is only 10 percent.

The VA emphasizes that the regulation change affects only pensions for non-service connected disabilities, as distin-

guished from the compensation paid for service-connected ailments.

SAN BRUNO, Calif., Dec. 13 (AP)—Citation, leading money winner at Tanforan race track in only two starts, needs only a victory in his next scheduled race at Santa Anita to become the richest winner in history.

The great three-year-old leaves Tanforan in his express car Wednesday for Santa Anita and the \$100,000 Maturity Jan. 29. His winnings to date are \$865,150. Victory at Santa Anita would put Citation above Stymlie's world record of \$911,335.

An easy win in the \$50,000 added Tanforan handicap Saturday made Citation top money winner of the Tanforan meet to date—in only two races. The handicap, in which he finished five lengths ahead of Stephafer, was good for \$31,800, and a sprint earlier last week netted a \$3,100 purse.
