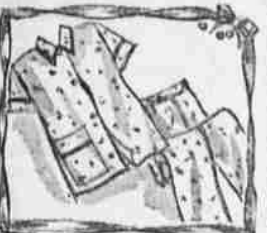

Liquor License Renewal Requires Local Approval

All licensees of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission holding retail licenses were reminded today by William H. Hammond, administrator, that approval of the local governing body having jurisdiction over their area is necessary before a license renewal is granted for 1949. In the case of those operations within incorporated cities, such approval would come from the city council. In areas outside of incorporated cities, the endorsement would come from the county court. In the case of certain governmental bodies in various parts of the state, a form of endorsement has been devised which does not constitute a clear cut recommendation. These approvals have sought to ward the assent in such a way as to not actually recommend the outlet, but rather to convey information to the effect that the governmental unit has encountered no objection to the issuance of a license. Such an endorsement is inadequate in the eyes of the Commission due to the fact that the law specifically refers to a "recommendation in writing." Such a statement accordingly, would not justify the issuance of a license renewal for 1949. The policy of requiring local endorsement of all license applications is a part of the Commission's continuing policy of soliciting the cooperation of all local governing bodies to achieve better control of alcoholic beverages.

Boost in Federal Salaries Favored By Ex-Pres. Hoover

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover said today the pay of government administrators ought to be increased "all along the line."

The salary raises must be given, he said, if the government hopes to keep skilled administrators in office and attract young men and women to government service. Speaking from experience, the ex-president also proposed that the government take over the full cost of running the White House, thus easing the burden on the president.

"I believe the people should at least give the president his board and room," he told a Senate Civil Service Committee. Hoover spoke as head of a bipartisan commission which is studying reorganization of the executive branch of government. The group's recommendations are due to go to Congress next month. Budget Director James E. Webb told the committee yesterday that President Truman favors raising the salaries of top-level government officials, with cabinet rank pay going up from \$15,000 to \$25,000.

Judge Wimberly Reversed, Upheld in Appealed Cases

The State Supreme Court affirmed one decision and reversed a second decision of the Douglas County Circuit Court, according to Associated Press report today from Salem. Judge Carl E. Wimberly's decision was reversed in the suit of A. W. Tripp and M. W. Sanders vs. J. B. Leonard and Judd Creek Lumber Company, brought over the sale of logs. The defendants, who appealed the case, were upheld. The opinion was written by Chief Justice George Rossman. Judge Wimberly's decision was affirmed in the suit of P. R. Weaver vs. Pearl L. Austin to foreclose a lease with option to buy real property. The defendant, Austin, had appealed the case. Justice Percy R. Kelly wrote the decision.

Army Flares Used To Drive Away Herd of Elk

YAKIMA, Wash., Dec. 14.—(AP)—Army flares were used to drive away 300 elk that invaded the Tieton Farm Area to escape heavy snow in the uplands. The animals had forded the icy Tieton River to reach greener pastures last week-end. After State Game Department employees drove the animals back, the men placed pot flares along the main trails to hold the elk in the Oak Creek refuge area. A Game Department official said at least four more men were being sent to help control the elk menace to farms. Fifty tons of hay was reported at hand to feed them. Several hundred other elk were reported coming down through canyons into Kittitas County yesterday.

(Continued from Page One) power. New power capacity creates new industry and keeps increasing power demands. Lack of Power May Retard West's Industrial Growth

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Far Western industrial growth may be retarded, by power shortages in some areas until 1954. The San Francisco Federal Reserve Bank announced that conclusion today after a study of the power and fuel outlook in the 12th Federal Reserve District. Its monthly review for November devoted the first of a series of articles to electric power. The problem is probably more critical in the Pacific Northwest, the article said, than in any comparable area in the seven states of the district. The situation there is primarily the outgrowth of the rapid development of the electro-metallurgical industry coupled with the prospective demand for power to meet irrigation pumping in the Columbia basin. "Plans for the establishment of new factories in the Lower Columbia River Basin," the article said, "have had to be dropped or indefinitely postponed because the available supply of firm electric power in that region is barely sufficient for the needs of already existing plants. . . . Both the Bonneville Power Administration and the public and private utility managers agree that even if presently approved federal power projects in the Pacific Northwest are completed as rapidly as is physically possible, the generating capacity of the region will not catch up with expected power requirements until at least 1954." 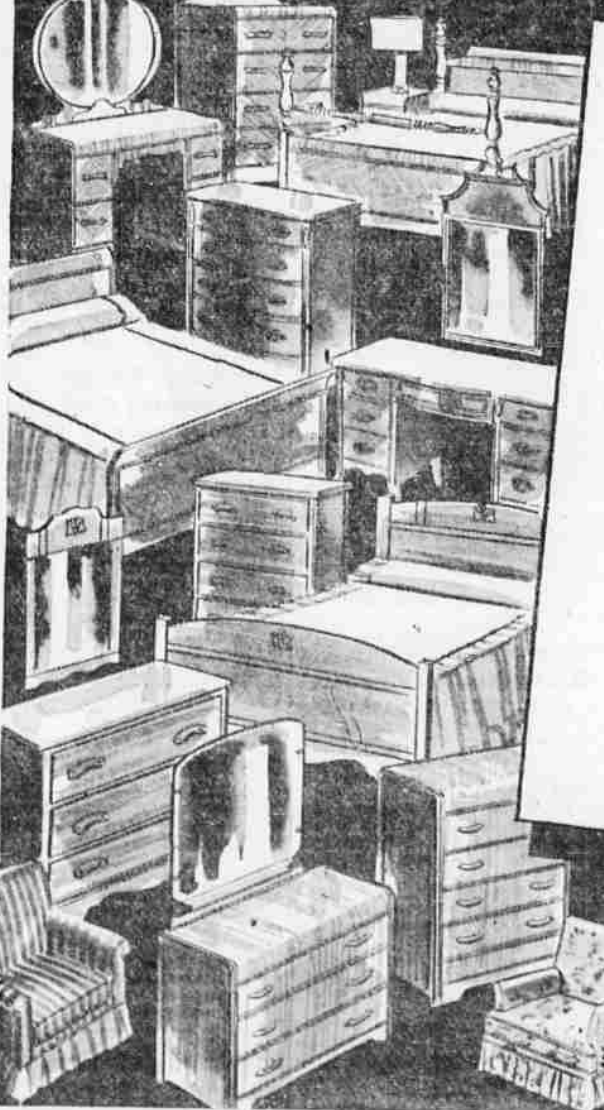
