

Remark Leads To Big Yule Airlift From Ft. Lewis

FORT LEWIS, Wash., Dec. 16—(AP)—A chance remark—the wish of a GI that he could fly home for Christmas—has snowballed into an air lift that will carry an estimated 700 soldiers east for the holidays.

The demand for chartered planes is so great, in fact, that travel agencies have had to call for help from California.

So far, 17 planes with a capacity of 26 to 50 passengers have been reserved. More probably will be needed, travel service agencies said, and it is expected that within a few days they will be "crying for planes."

It was a few days before Thanksgiving that Pvt. Gerald Roberts of Peoria, Ill., was sort of thinking out loud about getting home for Christmas.

He asked a fellow GI in the 9th infantry barracks: "I wonder if 10 or 15 of the fellows around here would throw in with me and charter a plane to get us home."

He was almost overwhelmed with takers. "10 or 15" grew to 50 and in short order the group had chartered a 60-passenger C-47 for a flight to Chicago.

The idea spread like a barracks rumor.

The men in the 72nd tank battalion liked the idea. Most of them lived too far away to be sure of arriving at their East Coast homes in time for Christmas by surface transportation.

In quick order 130 men in the outfit joined the travelers. They chartered three planes which will leave here the night of Dec. 21, when the Christmas furlough starts, and land them in New York and New England way-points within the following 24 hours. One of the 72nd's planes will stop at Chicago, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia.

Recruit Paul G. Currier of Brooklyn, organized his 23rd infantry pals and today he has three planes chartered and a growing list of "me too's."

Men from virtually every unit on the post are clamoring to get in on the "holiday-hop" as it has become known to the 17,000 men of this sprawling army post. All they need is the furlough—being granted to 50 per cent of the post's personnel—and cash for the round trip ticket.

Dixie Governors Unite Against Civil Rights Plan

SAVANNAH, Ga., Dec. 15—(AP)—Southern governors planned today to set up permanent shop in Washington to help wage war against federal civil rights proposals and carry the South's banner on other issues.

Several Dixie executives said a Southern Governors' bureau in the capital was likely to spring

from a resolution approved last night by the Southern Governors' conference.

The resolution deplored hostility toward the South in the rest of the country and declared this unfavorable attitude was "created and perpetuated by untruths and half-truths."

A Southern Foundation was established to "correct" the picture and give the rest of the nation the South's story.

Youth Faces 3 Counts In Death of Friend

SEATTLE, Dec. 16—(AP)—Three felony counts today faced Christopher Barker, 18-year-old Olympia youth, in connection with the death of his friend, Robert Kellogg, 19, also of Olympia.

Kellogg's body was found last week in Pierce County.

A Superior Court complaint accused Barker of riding knowingly in a stolen car, violating a firearms act and of first degree assault.

Police said earlier that a Port Lewis soldier, 34-year-old Pvt. Woodrow McIntire, signed a statement that he stabbed Kellogg during a scuffle in the back seat of a stolen car.

He said both Kellogg and Barker had shot at him.

Post Exchange Funds Missing From Transport

SEATTLE, Dec. 16—(AP)—Federal officials are investigating today the disappearance of \$3,200 in Post Exchange funds from the Army transport Fred C. Ainsworth.

Seattle port of embarkation authorities said the theft was discovered when the transport was one day out of Yokohama. It docked here yesterday.

The port said no arrests were made and passengers were allowed to leave the ship when it docked.

The money was taken from the ship's Post Exchange office.

Students Use Cafeteria Trays for Toboggans

Washington State College officials were puzzled by the disappearance of 50 plastic food trays from the college cafeteria.

W. H. Lund Transferred In Forest Service Work

SEATTLE, Dec. 16—(AP)—Walter H. Lund is the new chief of the Snoqualmie Forest's division of timber management for Washington and Oregon.

The appointment was announced yesterday by Supervisor H. J. Plumb. Lund has been in the Portland Forest Service office since 1942. Earlier he was supervisor at Wenatchee.

Canada Abolishes Restrictions On Foods, Other Goods

OTTAWA, Dec. 16—(AP)—Canada yesterday lifted import and quota restrictions on a broad list of foods and other goods, mostly made in the United States, effective Jan. 1.

Most of the commodities have been missing from Canadian stores this year.

Finance Minister Douglas Abbott said after Jan. 1, Canadians going to the United States and staying more than 48 hours will be allowed to bring back \$100 worth of gifts and personal articles "subject to the usual regulations." The present \$150 annual ration for pleasure travel abroad remains unchanged, however.

Abbott said Canadian gold and U. S. dollar holdings have improved considerably making possible the regulations. He said dollar holdings on Sept. 30 were \$854,900,000 compared to \$418,000,000 a year earlier.

Prohibitions will be lifted against such foods as yeast, fresh meats, canned meats, poultry, game, eggs, prepared cereals,

peanut butter, honey, beans, oysters and cleaned rice.

United States cigars and cigars will be allowed entry along with paper towels, paper napkins and doilies, candles, wet cell batteries, andirons and other commodities.
