

Law Stated For Naturalization Of Alien War Brides

Two years of residence with their husbands in the United States is the prime requirement for naturalization of alien war brides, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs has been informed.

Checking with the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization, the state veterans' agency learned that war brides who entered this country under Public Law 271 of the 79th Congress, which authorizes the entry on a non-quota basis of women who married American servicemen overseas, have a two-year waiting period before they may apply to become citizens.

They must, however, be married and living with their husbands during this time. Divorce, or separation because of death or for other reasons, will cause another year's tension of the waiting period, the immigration bureau said. Citizenship is not compulsory, it was pointed out.

The so-called war bride act expires this December 31, as does the alien fiancée act. Wives or fiancées of servicemen or veterans actually must be on United States soil to meet the deadline. The two-year waiting period for citizenship for fiancées starts after the date of marriage and the presentation of necessary documents to the immigration bureau to establish legal entry.

At the end of the waiting period the applicant for citizenship reports to the naturalization bureau, where her legal entry will be verified, and tests given regarding her knowledge of the English language and of American history and civics. The war bride then is sent to court for a final naturalization hearing.

Those concerned are advised to see their local county clerks for application blanks and necessary instructions.

Attorney's Fee In Whiskey Deal Under Advisement

PORTLAND, Dec. 17.—(P)—Legal services for the Oregon Liquor Commission in liquidating a distillery deal were worth \$40,000 to \$50,000, Wilber Henderson told the Commission yesterday.

Henderson's bill for \$15,000 has been questioned. He said that although a "reasonable fee" for work in connection with settling the state's connection with the Waterfall & Frazer and the Shawhan Distilleries would be \$40,000 to \$50,000, he put in a bill for much less because he also was the regular attorney for the Commission.

Last week Attorney General George Neuner suggested that the Commission might properly deduct from Henderson's bill any amounts which had been paid as retainer or per diem. He had received \$310 a month retainer and \$100 a day while actually working for the Commission. Commissioner Thomas L. Gaten said yesterday he doubted the Commission had authority to pay Henderson in the absence of a written agreement. Henderson said he thought it would be legal.

The Commission took the matter under advisement. Settlement of the fee is one of the remaining matters of business connected with purchase of

the two distilleries by Oregon and Washington during the war when whiskey supplies were short. The two Commission have tentatively agreed that Harold Shefelman, Seattle, be paid \$25,000 for his work for the Washington Commission. Henderson said he did "just as much work."

The two states, in the venture jointly, are each concerned with payments the other makes since costs are divided between them on a 53-47 percentage basis.

Crippled War Veterans Assault Roman Police

ROME, Dec. 17.—(P)—A crowd of crippled war veterans demonstrating for increased pensions yesterday twice assaulted police lines barring them from a government building. Mobile police reserves in jeeps charged the veterans. Several were knocked about and bruised. It was the first mass violence of Italy's latest wave of discontent among workers, jobless and pensioners.

Low Cost Housing Plan Launched Near Portland

PORTLAND, Dec. 17.—(P)—A low cost housing development promising two and three-bedroom homes with a price tag of \$6,000 to \$8,000 has been announced for the West Hills district here. Harry Mittleman, apartment building owner and manager, said he has taken an option on a 60-acre site. He expected the 400-home development will require \$3,000,000 of financing. Rental apartment units may also be built at the same location, he said.

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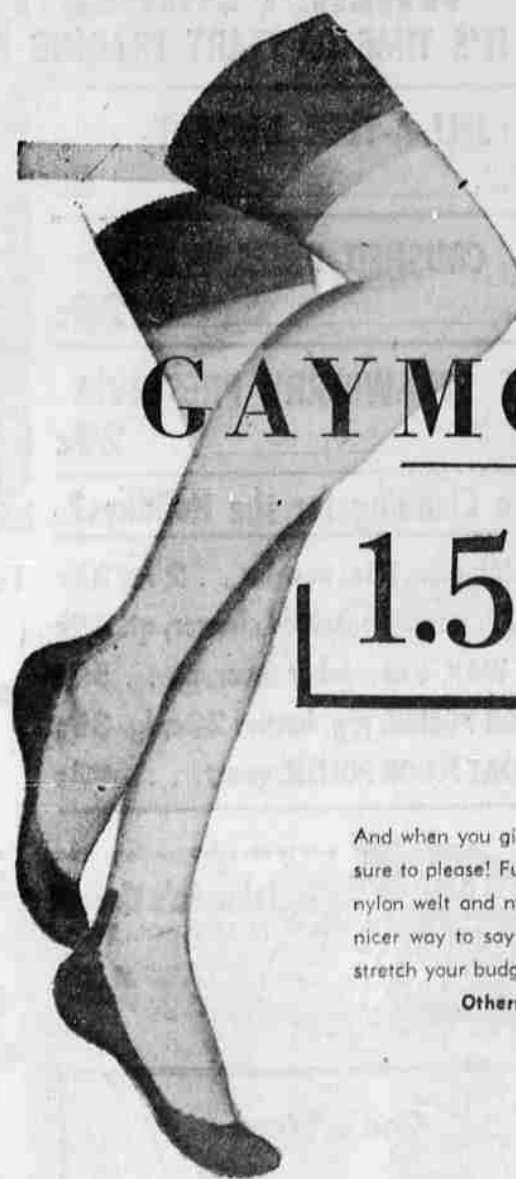


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
