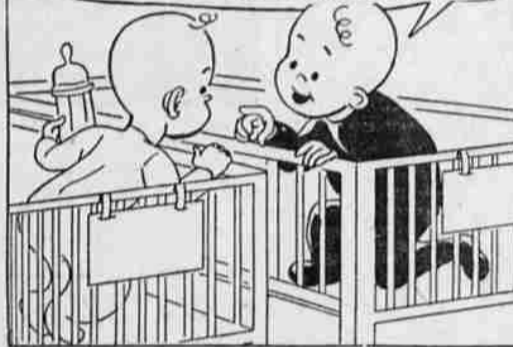

Privilege Tax On Phone Co. Sought By Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 18—(AP)—The city of Klamath Falls gave notice yesterday of a claim on the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company for a 5 per cent gross income privilege tax for the period of telephone company operations here without a franchise.

Notice of the claim, contained in a letter to the company by Mayor Ed Ostendorf, climaxes over a year of unproductive discussion of a franchise to replace the old one which expired on January 6, 1948.

The City Council last Monday night passed a motion to the effect that the city take advantage of a state law authorizing a city to impose a privilege tax up to 5 per cent on private utilities using its streets and alleys without a franchise.

Telephone company officials have not commented as to what action they may take concerning the tax, but it is possible that the Klamath situation might develop into the first legal test of the state law under which the city proposes collection.

The company's old franchise called for a 2 per cent gross income tax. In general negotiations over the new franchise have seen the city asking for a boost of the tax rate to 3 per cent and the company wanting to continue at the old 2 per cent rate.

In the negotiations between representatives of company and city, the company represented that the city's demand for a tax rate was discriminatory. The city has a general 2 per cent tax on the gross incomes of utilities, in addition to taxes fixed in franchises.

Three Drunks Arraigned; Fourth Forfeits Bail

Three persons were arraigned in Municipal Court this morning, while a fourth person forfeited bail for non-appearance.

Earl A. Bryson, 48, and Paul Brinkley, 54, were both committed to 10 days in the city jail by Municipal Judge Ira B. Riddle on charges of drunkenness in a public place. They entered pleas of guilty and were committed in lieu of \$20 fines.

Fred Theodore Long, alias "Pistol Pete," 43, 546 Mill St., forfeited \$20 bail posted on a disorderly conduct charge. He did not appear. The Roseburg Cafe was prosecuting witness in the case, Judge Riddle reported.

Dale Alfred Fahndrick pleaded guilty to a speeding violation and was fined \$20 by Judge Riddle.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 18—(AP)—Mrs. Whitaker Chambers, wife of the key witness in the current spy hearings, was free in \$1,000 bail today on a charge of causing the death of a pedestrian.

She was booked when Mrs. Maggie Thomas, 70, died in a hospital last night three hours after being struck by an automobile in North Baltimore.

Chambers, confessed ex-Communist courier, appeared in magistrate's court with his wife. He had just arrived here from New York after testifying before a Federal Grand Jury probing charges of Communist espionage activities in this country.

Mrs. Chambers said she was on her way to meet him at a railroad station when the accident occurred. After bond was arranged the couple left for their Westminster, Md., farm.

OVERHEAD CABLE

Last Rites Held For Ex-Commissioner Ryan

Marion Ross Ryan, 87, died in a Eugene hospital Wednesday, Dec. 15, after a short illness.

He was born in Whitley County, Kentucky, Jan. 4, 1861, and for the last 60 years has been a resident of Drain. He served one term as county commissioner from 1908 to 1912 and also served as director on the Drain-Reedsport Commission. He was a charter member of the Neighbors of Woodcraft at Drain and was still a member at the time of his death. In former years he was active in community affairs.

Surviving are his widow, Anna; a half-sister, and two half-brothers in Missouri and California. Services were held in the Methodist Church, Drain, today at 1:30 p. m. Rev. Chas. A. Edwards officiated. Interment was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Arrangements were in care of the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Funeral Services Set For Richard Baldwin

Funeral services for Richard M. Baldwin, 60, well-known resident of Roseburg and Myrtle Creek, who died suddenly Dec. 16, will be held in the I. O. O. F. Cemetery at Myrtle Creek, Sunday at 2 p. m. with the Rev. Mr. Baird of the Christian Church at Myrtle Creek officiating. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Long & Orr Mortuary.

Baldwin was born at Mountain Grove, Mo., June 18, 1888, and came to Douglas County when he was three years old. He attended schools at Cleveland and Roseburg. He was married to Faye Weaver in Roseburg, Aug. 3, 1914. Baldwin was for many years a painting contractor.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Faye Baldwin, Myrtle Creek, and a son, T/Sgt. Marvin Baldwin, USAAF, stationed at Johnson Island in the South Pacific area. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Lovey Potter, Salem, and three brothers, Ralph Baldwin, Sutherlin; Jess Baldwin, Portland, and Ben Baldwin, American Lake, Wash.

The plan, suggested by the Federal Health Service for birth certificate, will be put into effect by the state board of health. The first baby registered will be 1-36-49-000001. That means: He was born in the United States

(1); he was born in Oregon (36); he was born in 1949 (49); he was the first baby registered in 1949 (000001).
