

Roseburg Indians Beat Milwaukie 43-37

Newby's Team Forges Ahead In 2nd Period

Blank, Agee Commence Scoring Spree to Give Victory; Newberg Next

Coach Jack Newby's varsity Indians came from behind in the second quarter at Milwaukie Friday night, to win 43-37, in the opener of a scheduled four-game away-from-home series.

Milwaukie started out fast on its home court, getting a 14-9 lead at the end of the first quarter, but Daryl Blank and Clint Agee started firing at the basket in the second quarter closed the gap. Bob Hubbard tied up the game at 17-17 from the free throw line, and Roseburg was never threatened after that. Roseburg led 26-18 at half and 38-27 at the end of the third quarter.

Agee and Blank maintained complete control of the backboards, while Bob Schindler's crack long-distance shooting began to click in the second quarter, to help cut considerably in the scoring department.

On a jump ball, the king-sized Agee tipped one in from the foul line, thereby bringing down the house and helping to demoralize the Milwaukie cagers.

Total fouls made during the game by Roseburg was 13, while Milwaukie collected 17. No one fouled out. Roseburg plunked in 13 free throws out of 20 tries, while Milwaukie connected with six free throws out of 18 attempts. All 10 members of the Indian traveling squad put in a lot of playing time last night. "The game was rough and fast," Newby said, "but the game against Newberg tonight should be a lot rougher."

Bears Practicing For Bowl Game

BERKELEY, Calif., Dec. 18.—A medium-light scrimmage engaged the California Bears today. Coach Lynn Waldorf announced twice-daily practices would begin Monday for the New Year's Day Rose Bowl meeting with Northwestern.

Waldorf said he was satisfied with his team's training. "We're really not far behind schedule in spite of the bad weather this week," he pointed out. "But then, we didn't plan too much—just a review of plays, timing and blocking. Beginning Monday we'll really go at it earnestly."

Today's scrimmage is the first since practice began last Monday.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Northwestern's 44-man football squad, hopeful of becoming the third consecutive Big Nine team to win in the Rose Bowl, leaves for Los Angeles by special train today.

Oregon Defeats Cal Team 51-50; OSC Impressive

(By The Associated Press) Basketball victory flags were flying today at three of the north's Coast Conference schools and the banner at a fourth was just barely at half mast.

It's not so much the wins last night that gave a tipoff on what the regular season may hold, but the foes who were humbled. As a puff to Northern Division prowess consider these scores:

Perhaps the most significant game was Oregon's upset of the California Bears. Southern Division champs last season and considered a green, but up-and-coming title threat for 1948-49.

Almost on a par were Washington's impressive triumph over the strong Stewart Independent club from San Francisco and Oregon State's showing against the Bittners, who have run their victory string to 22 straight.

Oregon's Ducks, trailing at halftime, 30-23, fought their way back to knot the count at 46-46 five minutes before the gun.

The lead see-sawed on free throws until guard Bob Lavey was fouled with three seconds to go. He calmly stepped to the line and canned the gift shot that gave the Ducks their one-point win. Mike O'Neill, California forward, led the scoring with 21 points. Lavey was high for Oregon with 13.

Washington, likewise, had to come from behind, but did it earlier against Coach Hank Lulsetti's independents.

Center Sammy White, a whirlwind dervish at the key, was high man with 17. Ex-Husky Jack Nichols paced Stewart with 15. Oregon State made a gallant bid to beat the Bittners but fell short after tying it up at 41-41 with 3½ minutes left to play.

Cliff Crandall, Oregon State's mainstay, was kayoed in a melee just before the gun and carried unconscious from the floor.
