PORTLAND, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Don't chop down that Christmas tree. It may cost you \$1000. So warned officials today, reminding that you must get a permit from the owner before swinging the ax. Besides a \$1000 fine for unauthorized chopping, there also is the possibility of a year's imprisonment.

Homer Lyon, state reforestation director, said the commercial tree cut this year would be between 600,000 and 650,000, a record. About half goes outside the state—principally to Los Angeles, but with some to Kansas City and Hawaii.

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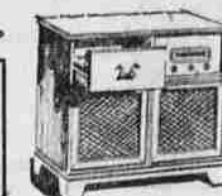
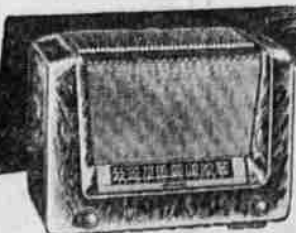
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
