For years I have had a kind of informal throwing away day during the week before Santa Claus comes. It consists largely of cleaning my desk.

That doesn't seem like much of an adventure. But to me it is an epic task. For I am one of those forlorn folk cursed with a life-long habit of being disorderly.

At home my wife complains my clothes closet looks like the scene of a rummage sale. My desk at the office resembles the group love nest of a flock of magpies.

Each January the desk starts the new year as clean as the proverbial whistle (although a whistle could really be called clean only in comparison to a well-used tuba).

But the daily snow of letters soon begins to hide its green surface. By spring the top no longer can be seen. By summer the stack is knee high, and by fall it is waist deep. A small child, thrown into it accidentally, would suffocate before it could be found and rescued.

Snow Avalanches Block Highways In Washington

SEATTLE, Dec. 20. (AP)—Road and line crews struggled today to repair damage wrought by weekend rains in Washington's mountains and snows in western Canada.

Rain-loosened snow avalanched across the state's main east-west highways through Stevens and Snoqualmie passes, bringing traffic to a virtual halt.

The state patrol reported a

trickle of traffic was able to grope over the precarious road eastward from Snoqualmie Pass summit, but many western Washington residents were trapped there and were being cared for at lodges by the volunteer ski patrol and the Forest Service.

One car was reported to have been bowled 200 feet down a steep decline by the Stevens Pass slide, but its occupants were rescued by ski patrolmen and motorists. Another auto was reported caught in a slide in Snoqualmie Pass, but there were no details.

British Columbia was off yesterday from telephone and telegraph communication with the United States and eastern Canada by a one-foot fall of soggy snow.

Some areas were completely isolated as the storm knocked out powerlines and closed off roads. Old-timers said it was the worst snowstorm in 15 years.

The snow and rain showers accompanied a new Pacific storm that sprayed the entire coastal area with win-whipped rain.

Though rivers throughout the state with the increased runoff in the mountains, the weather bureau predicted a return of freezing weather to the high altitudes would check the threat.
