

# Indians Down Forest Grove By One Point

### Agee's Basket on Free Throw in Final Seconds Posts 44-43 Victory

Clint Agee's deadly aim at the free-throw line saved the day for a hard-pressed Indian team at Forest Grove Monday night. He flipped the ball into the bucket just 17 seconds this side of the final gun, making the final score 44-43.

It was a pitched battle all the way, with neither team allowing more than a four-point separation in score. The first quarter ended 14-14, while Roseburg had the Forest Grove edged by a 27-25 score at the half. The Groviers pulled ahead when high scoring forward Parmaly netted one, but Bub Schindler leveled the tally at 43-43 with one through the hoop. At this point, Agee put in the game-winning digit in the score. Roseburg took the ball off the backboard and it was shoveled to

Schindler. He put on a brilliant demonstration of dribbling around the Forest Grove cagers, until time ran out.

Hubbard proved to be high point man for the Roseburgers, with 13, while Parmaly accumulated more than any other two Grove cagers, with a 15 count.

Roseburg was charged with seven fouls, while Forest Grove picked up 14. Out of 13 free-throw tries, Roseburg netted seven, while 10 out of 17 were good for the Grove club.

The first quarter saw both teams start fast and score rapidly. No Indian fouled out, while Montgomery of Forest Grove finally took a rest on five personal fouls.

Newby reports the men are still game, but are "beginning to tire."

The Indian cagers end their four-game away-from-home series tonight, with a return tilt at Forest Grove.

# Brecheen, Sewell, Sain Top Hurlers In National Loop

 NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Harry (The Cat) Brecheen, only left-hander in history to win three games in one world series, posted the best earned run mark among National League pitchers in the 1948 season.

The stylish lefthander of the St. Louis Cardinals allowed 58 earned runs in 233 innings for a 2.24 mark, tops among moundmen who pitched ten or more complete games, according to final official averages released today.

Brecheen, who won three games for the Cards against the Boston Red Sox in the 1946 World Series, also led the league in shutouts with seven and in strike outs with 149. The 34-year-old star won 20 games and lost 7, the first time he has hit the 20 mark in his big league career.

Sewell, Sain Rate Next  
 Rip Sewell, 40-year-old righthander of the Pittsburgh Pirates, won 13 games and lost three to finish with the best win-loss percentage, .813. Sewell, a 150-pounder, started the longest winning streak, eight games. He started his skid on July 22 and kept it intact the rest of the race.

Righthander Johnny Sain of the champion Boston Braves was the circuit's workhorse. Sain won the most games, 24; started the most, 29; completed the most, 28; hurled the most innings, 315; faced the most batters, 1,313, and yielded the most hits, 297.

Cincinnati's relief specialist, Harry Gumbert, participated in the most games, 61, and finished the most games, 46. Larry Jansen of New York allowed the most runs, 125, and Murry Dickson of St. Louis the most earned runs, 116. Dickson also served up the most homers, 39, a major league record. Southpaw Johnny Vander Meer of Cincinnati was the wildest pitcher, allowing the most bases on balls, 124.

Rex Barney of Brooklyn pitched the only no-hit no-run game, stopping the New York Giants, 2-0 on Sept. 9. Barney, along with Kent Peterson of Cincinnati and Sheldon Jones of New York, hit the most batters, six. Jones committed the most wild pitches, 10.

# Oregon Webfoots Working Out On Field at Dallas

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 21.—(AP)—The Cotton Bowl picture was complete today—Oregon was in Dallas working across town from Southern Methodist for their Jan. 1 football date.

The Webfoots, 37 strong, arrived last night from Eugene, Ore., in a chartered plane to be greeted by Dallas and Cotton Bowl notables.

The Webfoots got down to serious business as they started a two-day practice sessions this morning. Coach Jim Alken called for a scrimmage.

Alken said his squad was in excellent condition and ready for a wide-open game with the parsimonious Methodists in the Cotton Bowl battle.

Southern Methodist, which also has been doing plenty of rough work, reported two members of the squad on the injury list. One of them, Fred Goodwin, regular center, has a knee hurt that may keep him out of the Jan. 1 game. John Milam, pass-catching wingman, has an injured elbow but is expected to be all right by Cotton Bowl time.

Three Negroes on the Oregon squad are staying in Negro homes while in Dallas. A number of Negro newspapermen and photographers were at the plane last night to greet them.

## Bears' Tackle Regards Northwestern Lightly

BERKELEY, Calif., Dec. 21.—(AP)—To hear tackle Jim Turner talk, the California Bears aren't overly impressed with the football they expect to find Northwestern playing in the Rose Bowl on New Year's day.

"We'll stop that stuff," said Turner after he and his mates watched the reserves run through Wildcat formations yesterday.

Turner, one of Lynn Waldorf's best linemen, was confident his injured knee would permit him to play at Pasadena. He was hurt early in the season against Washington and has been idle since.

## Albert Bauer New Head Of Portland C. of C.

PORTLAND, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Albert Bauer was inaugurated as president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce yesterday, and pledged himself to work toward Columbia Basin and Willamette Valley dam development.

He placed more appropriations for McNary Dam at the top of a list of "things we will need in 1949." He also urged rapid completion of Detroit, Dorena, and Meridian dams in the Willamette basin.

peak. That rate, he declared, will enable the lumber industry to carry on under sustained yield basis.
