Gold, Silver Outputs Decline During October

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Mine production of gold declined 15 per cent during October chiefly because of a seasonal drop of 31 per cent in Alaska output, the Bureau of Mines reports.

October gold production totaled 175,890 fine ounces.

Silver production, totaling 3,070,656 ounces, was three per cent lower than in September.

Silver output in Idaho, the leading producing state, was down 15 per cent due primarily to a reduction in ore output from Sunshine Mining Company properties near Kellogg.

California led in gold production with 31,622 ounces; followed by Alaska with 31,412. Production in other states included:

Idaho, 4,720; Montana, 5,000; Oregon, 1,507; Washington, 7,000; silver production in October by states included:

Idaho, 820,000; Montana, 375,000; Oregon, 1,575; Washington, 2,000; Alaska, 4,225.

Portland Clubwoman, Man Die in Auto Court

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Dec. 27. — (AP) — A woman who died in an auto court cabin with a man companion was identified by Coroner Vance G. White today as Mrs. Sayra S. Kaadt, Portland, Ore. clubwoman and former president of the Portland Parent-Teachers Association.

She and a man identified as Harry E. Mathews, Chicago photo engraver, were found dead Friday where they had registered as "Mr. and Mrs. H. Mathews." A coroner's jury blamed the deaths on suffocation.

Mrs. Kaadt's husband, Dr. Peter S. Kaadt, is gravely ill in a Portland hospital, after a long illness.

Mrs. Kaadt, who was prominent in Portland clubwork, was named to the advisory board of the Oregon School for Delinquent Girls at Hillcrest, Ore., in 1943. She was a former school teacher in Portland.

Her daughter, Mrs. David Epps of Sweet Home, Ore., was advised of the death and expected to arrive here tomorrow.

Mrs. Bushfield Resigns As S. Dakota Senator

PIERRE, S. D., Dec. 28. — (AP) — Mrs. Vera C. Bushfield resigned yesterday as U. S. senator from Dakota, and Gov. George T. Mickelson said he was immediately appointing Sen. elect Karl E. Mundt, Madison, as a successor. However, Mundt will not qualify for the office until today after a report of the House Un-American Activities Committee is filed.

Mrs. Bushfield has filled the position since Oct. 6, when she was appointed to succeed the late Sen. Harlan J. Bushfield. He died Sept. 27.

Insurance Co. Denies Dewey Will be Its Head

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. — (AP) — Rumors that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey would become president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company when his term of office expires in 1950 were denied by the company yesterday.

Baby Born After Plane Lands Lives Only Short Time

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. — (AP) — A German war bride gave premature birth to a girl yesterday a few minutes after a trans-Atlantic plane landed at Idlewild Airport, but the infant died shortly afterwards at an Army hospital.

The big plane had winged in from Germany with another dead baby aboard.

As it landed, with 41 war brides, G. I. husbands and children aboard, Mrs. Elwira Quist, 23, was carried from the plane to a nearby building where she gave birth to the baby. The infant was three and one-half months premature. Army doctors said.

Mrs. Quist is the wife of Pvt. Lyle Quist, 19, of Crookston, Minn.

As the child was being born, the body of Dorothy Muniz, four and one-half month old child of Cpl. and Mrs. Paul Muniz of Trinidad, Colo., was removed from the plane.

Authorities said the child died in the arms of her mother, Charlotte, 20, shortly after the plane left Goose Bay, Labrador.

Army doctors said Mrs. Muniz told them the baby had been in a hospital in Germany for three months before the family left for America. They said the child apparently suffered from mal-

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nutrition, being unable to assimilate food.

Diesel Engines Throw 178 Men Out of Jobs

BOSTON, Dec. 28. — (AP) — The New Haven Railroad announced yesterday 178 of the 600 workers in its locomotive repair shops at Readville would be let go Jan. 1.

Vice President J. F. Doolan said the men would not be needed "due to the progressive substitution of Diesel-electric locomotives for steam locomotives."

NOTED BISHOP DIES

HEREFORD, Eng., Dec. 28. — (AP) — Dr. Richard Godfrey Parsons, Bishop of Hereford, died Sunday after a year's illness following an accident. He was 66.

During the war he became known as "London's most-bombed Bishop" because four large churches near his home were destroyed by bombs. At that time he was Bishop of Southwark, a South London Diocese of the Church of England.



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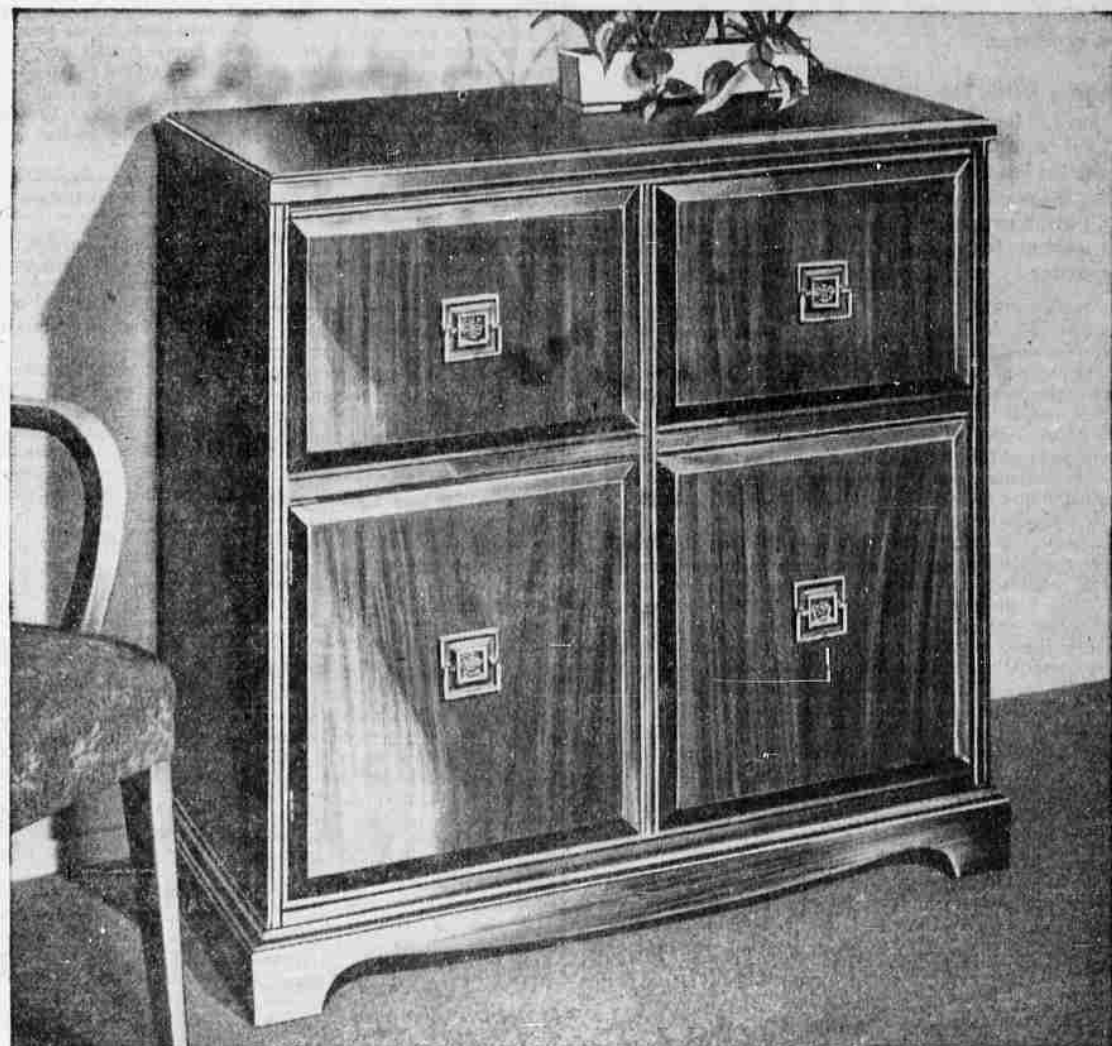
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
