Suggested Treats For Holidays And Wintry Weather

Here's a meat loaf recipe good enough for the most important meal of the week—Sunday din-ner:

Mexican Meat Loaf
(10-12 servings)
One pound ground beef, 1 pound ground pork, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 onion, diced, 1 cup milk, 1 tablespoon chopped pars-ley, 1 cup diced green pepper, 1 egg, beaten, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup tomato soup.

Mix together until thoroughly blended the ground beef, ground pork, bread crumbs, diced onion, milk, chopped parsley, diced green pepper, beaten egg and salt. Place meat loaf mixture in a 2-quart heat-resistant glass loaf pan. Pour tomato soup over meat. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for one hour.

And here's another variation of the meat note theme:

Juicy Meat Loaf
(Serves 6-8)
Two tablespoons finely chopped onion, 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper, 1 pound round steak, ground, 1 teaspoon salt, few grains pepper, 1 egg, 1 cup drained canned tomatoes, 21

finely rolled salted crackers (1 cup crumbs).

Saute onion and green pepper in small amount of fat or suet. Add ground meat, salt, pepper, egg, tomatoes and cracker crumbs. Mix well. Pack into greased loaf pan. Bake in moder-ately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes. Invert loaf on platter. Garnish with radishes and parsley.

Ginger Bread Pudding

(8 servings)
Three cups dry bread crumbs, 31 cups milk, scalded, 1 cup extra sweet corn syrup, 1 cup melted butter or fortified mar-garine, 2 eggs, lightly beaten, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 cup seedless raisins.

Soak the crumbs in the hot milk 30 minutes. Combine the syrup, butter or margarine, eggs, salt, vanilla, ginger and raisins. Mix and combine with the crumb mixture. Pour into a lightly greased baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees F.) until firm, 30 to 35 minutes. Serve hot with top milk or cream.

Chocolate Puffs

(Yield: about 4 dozen)
One-half pound sweet choco-late, 1 ounce (1 square) bitter chocolate, 2 2/3 cups crisp rice cereal.
Melt sweet and bitter chocolate together over hot water. Stir cereal in gently so as not to crush. Be sure it is thoroughly cov-ered with chocolate. Drop by tea-spoonsful onto waxed paper. Place in refrigerator if necessary until chocolate is set. Store in cool place.

Cereal Nuggets

(Yield: 1 dozen squares or 2 dozen balls)
Three-quarters cup sugar, 1 cup light corn syrup, 1 cup water, 6 cups crisp rice cereal, 1 cup chopped salted peanuts, 1 cup chopped raisins.

Combine sugar, corn syrup and water. Place over low heat and stir constantly until sugar is dis-solved. Cook syrup until a firm ball forms when a little of the mixture is dropped into cold water (250 degrees F.). Combine cereal, peanuts, and raisins in a shallow bowl, pour syrup over mixture, mixing well. Pack light-ly into greased shallow pan 7x11 inches; cool. Cut into squares. To make cereal balls, place bowl with cereal, peanuts and raisins in hot water. Pour syrup over mixture, mixing well. Grease hands lightly and press cereal into balls. Ribbon may be in-serted for Christmas tree decora-tions.
